

Hail the Heroes of Ásatrú that paved the way! Hail the Asatru Folk Assembly! Hail the Æsir!







AFA Ásatrú Academy

In the past few Runestone articles about the Ásatrú Academy, we have begun introducing ideas about the Waldorf philosophy of education. While there are many homeschool and educational theories, the foundation of Steiner's work is the whole person, whole family, and their values.

The essential element in early childhood education is actually the educator, who shapes and influences the children's environment, not only through the furnishings, activities, and rhythms of the day, but most important, through the qualities of her own being and her relationships... These qualities, which include attitudes and gestures both outer and inner, permeate the early childhood setting and deeply influence the children, who take them up through a process of imitation. The results of such experiences appear much later in the child's life through predispositions, tendencies, and attitudes toward life's opportunities and challenges.

Early childhood education demands an ongoing process of self-education by the adult. If we again ask, what makes a Waldorf program "Waldorf," the answers might be sought less in the particular activities or rhythms or materials and furnishings, and more in the extent to which these outer aspects are harmonious expressions of inner qualities, attitudes, capacities, and intentions of the teacher – all of which can have a health-giving effect on the children, both in the moment and for the rest of their lives.

Rudolf Steiner spoke on a number of occasions about experiences essential for healthy early childhood education, including the following:

- Love and warmth
 Care for the environment and nourishment for the senses
 Creative, artistic experience
 Meaningful adult activity as an example for the child's imitation
 Free, imaginative play
 Protection for the forces of childhood
 Gratitude, reverence, and wonder
 Joy, humor, and happiness


HELP YOU, HELP THEM

Days of Remembrance

Sveinbjörn Beinteinsson | July 4th



Y July 4, 1924 - December 23, 1993 1

Allsherjargoði Sveinbjörn Beinteinsson entered Miðgarðr on July 4th, 1924. He is known for reviving Ásatrú in Iceland, having the Æsir be recognized by the Icelandic government, and forming the Ásatrúarfélagið for that purpose. While his organization is no longer what he created it to be, his work in the early reforging of Ásatrú is forever honoured by the Asatru Folk Assembly!

Sveinbjörn lived his entire life in western Iceland, with much of his early adulthood spent as a poet and sheep farmer. He was also married, and sired two sons with his wife, Svanfriður, in the 1960s.

The winter of 1972 saw the beginnings of Sveinbjörn's greatest deeds, as he and three friends would meet in a Reykjavik café to discuss Ásatrú. They quickly decided that the faith of their ancestors was one to be practiced as a community, as one Folk, and began the work to make this a reality. These four men were the earliest leading figures of the Ásatrúarfélagið: Allsherjargoði Sveinbjörn, future Allsherjargoði Jörmundur Ingi Hansen, Goði Þorsteinn Guðjónsson, and theosophist Dagur Þorleifsson.

Sveinbjörn described the revival of Icelandic Ásatrú as "the desire that Icelanders could have their own faith, and nourish it no less than imported religions." Dagur emphasized a return to nature and a rejection of the negatives of industrial civilization. The Ásatrúarfélagið was officially formed on the "first day of summer" in 1972, with Sveinbjörn very soon after being named Allsherjargoði.

Just before Jól 1972, Allsherjargoði Sveinbjörn and Goði Þorsteinn sought official government recognition for our faith. They visited Ólafur Jóhannesson, the Icelandic minister of justice and ecclesiastical affairs. He initially thought the two Goðar were joking about their request, but then asked for paperwork to be filled out when he realized that they were serious. Shortly after Sveinbjörn and Þorsteinn exited the building, the power in the center of town went out due to a large and sudden thunderstorm, showing that Lord Þórr himself gave his stamp of approval! Many Christian Icelanders at the time even viewed this as a sign!

The Bishop of Iceland, and others, recommended denying the request for recognition as the faith was and is Folkish in nature. After another five months or so of discussion and paperwork, the Ásatrúarfélagið was officially recognized by the government of Iceland as a religious organization in May of 1973. This gave them the rights of any other church: marriage, share of the church tax, etc, which they still hold to this day.

On August 5th of 1973, Allsherjargoði Sveinbjörn led the first public Blót in nearly one thousand years. The rite took place at his farm in heavy rain, under a statue of Lord Þórr, who had intervened on their behalf eight months earlier. A local newspaper described the Blót as "vigorous and energetic"!

Allsherjargoði Sveinbjörn held his title until his death around Jól of 1993. He lived a simple but happy life on his farm, without many luxuries. He was an author and poet, having published eight different written works and three different musical recordings. He was said to be soft spoken, and even a bit shy, but his thunderous impact on our native faith more than made up for this!

Despite standing nearly alone in his mission to reestablish Icelandic loyalty to the Æsir, he never wavered or compromised in his duty to Gods and Folk. His resolve was so

mighty that even Lord Þórr himself intervened to sway the minister's decision to recognize the Ásatrúarfélagið!

Alexander Rud Mills | July 15th



Y July 15, 1885 - April 8, 1964 1

Born in 1885 in Tasmania, Australia, Alexander Rud Mills was a barrister, author, and early proponent for the revival of our ancestral faith. The Asatru Folk Assembly honors him with a Day of Remembrance every year on the 15th of July, and Þórshof holds a shrine in his name!

While there is not a great deal of knowledge on his early life, we do know that Mills attempted to serve in the Australian armed forces in World War I, but was rejected on medical grounds. Regardless of this rejection, he devoted his life to serving our Folk, and honouring our Gods, by establishing the Anglecynn Church of Odin.

Alexander Rud Mills was something of an outlier among our Folk Heroes, as he was one of the first people to embrace what we call "forward-facing Ásatrú"— he established a real church with hymns, vigils, virtues, and communion, and with an authentic English flavor reminiscent of the faith of his Anglo-Saxon ancestors.

On May 7th, 1942, he was placed in an internment camp for his Folkish beliefs, due to the political climate of the Second World War. He was interned until December of the same year. While many men would crumble and hide after something like this, the Hero of Þórshof did no such thing. After his release, he immediately returned to sharing his love for the Æsir, publishing numerous works honoring our Gods and Folk. He was so devoted that he did not marry until the age of 65!

Alexander Rud Mills passed away on April 8th, 1964, just 13 years after he married. His loving wife Evelyn passed away nine years later, and was laid to rest next to her husband in a Church of England cemetery. Although Mills left this world over 60 years ago, his legacy is stronger than ever! His portrait, as well as an original print of his book Hael, Odin!, have been immortalized in a shrine inside the Vé of our very own Þórshof! This shrine sits mere feet away from the mural of Lord Þórr that our members worship at on a regular basis, in a real Hof dedicated to one of the Gods that Mills devoted his life to. He may have been forgotten by many of his Folk in his time, but the Asatru Folk Assembly honours and remembers this Hero!

Holiday



Sigrblót literally means 'Victory Blót' and was celebrated by our ancestors in the early summer months. On the one hand, our ancestors were celebrating their victory over the harsh winter. Life had won. On the other hand, our ancestors performed Blót to ask for victory. With the warm weather and the completion of the planting time, the men often turned their minds to the duty of man. War. Practically speaking, summer was the better time to organize new campaigns and to set sail.

In our modern times, the vast majority of us are not familiar with war in a personal way. We do, however, all have our struggles. Sigrblót is a time to refocus. It is the time we can use to reorganize our priorities, to figure out the steps we need to take in order to reach our ultimate goals, and to break free from those that we struggle with.

One great way to celebrate Sigrblót is to offer a meal or some other item that you spent time making in thanks for the victory of life. Another option is to sacrifice a bladed weapon to the fire. A nice knife, for example, the blade dulled in battle so that it cannot be used against you (this is symbolic, of course), offered to the fire is a great way to ask our Gods for victory during the coming winter.

This long-running AFA festival is dedicated to our ancestral mothers, the Disir. Started in 2012, the Asatru Folk Assembly's Winter Nights festival was hosted at a beloved camp in Pennsylvania for its first decade. This year, for the second time, Winter Nights XIV will be held from October 10th – 12th, in Cheshire County, New Hampshire. We build upon the success of the Asatru Folk Assembly by making new friends and renewing old friendships. We look forward to seeing members and friends!

Autumn has officially started. The days are noticeably shorter. The nights are noticeably cooler. The trees are ablaze with the colors of Fall and the crunching of the fallen leaves underfoot has begun. All around us the world is dying. This was a time of drawing in close, of hearth and home and family. For our ancestors, this was not an Autumn festival, but a quiet Winter rite in which the female spirits were honored in a rite called Disirblót.

Today, Winter Nights is often seen as a death of the physical world, the world we can see, and the reawakening of the intangible. It is the world of high energy, of spirits. It is that deeper feeling and connection to the things we know to be there. This is the time we honor our Disir—our female ancestors. We remember that without our ancient mothers we could not be. They cared for the home and the hearth fires. They cared for their families. Our ancient mothers, with strength and determination, raised the next generation against odds we cannot really begin to fathom.

With the harvests finished, there is a quiet lull before we turn our minds to the hectic holiday season. Now is a good time to turn inward in introspection, and to self-improvement. It is also the time to meditate on things of a more spiritual nature. Connect to the energy that is always there.

Your registration fee includes all workshops, lectures, meals, tent sites, and of course our holy rites. Only AFA members and vouched-for guests will be admitted to this event. If you are not an AFA Member you should confirm with the member who is vouching for you that they will do so when asked about your registration.

AFA Prison Ministry



The importance of this AFA Prison Ministry is so much more than just for those who are actually incarcerated, it benefits not only them as followers of Asatru but their families and loved ones on the outside as they will see the noticeable change in their demeanor and demand that our faith commands for them to lead a noble life. We all are future ancestors and will help them be examples of our faith and not be a burden or a product of recidivism.

We are compiling letters from prisoners that are Educational, Empowering, and Encouraging along with special spiritual writings from our Gothar to create a quarterly newsletter to be distributed to inmates, institutions, and jails. Our mission is not about providing free books or literature to bored prisoners who simply want free stuff. We intend on making real-world change for the better of our folk.

""No packed rooms in the prisons; in each institution I have only a few people; occasionally about a dozen, but 5-6 is more common. I certainly do not want the Fellowship to be a club for cons, or ex-cons; the advantage is that when in prison the inmates have time to discuss and digest what they read, a point that often is lost to people on the outside in the hubbub of daily concerns" - Else Christensen

By the example of our Folkmother, Else Christensen, we will also be going into prisons as we are able to. Some of our Gothar and other leadership, will be going into the prisons to hold study groups, lead blot, and encourage continued growth in the folk inside.

- What a typical workday looks like





Feeding Families, Fueling Hope.

June had its challenges! We learned several years ago that it never works to give out food while hoisting a major event like Miðsumar. In the end, for June we distributed twice -- Father's Day the 15th and the following Sunday. Turnout was low on Father's Day for the obvious reasons. Combined, we had a very solid turnout for June.



Since then, we've had numerous requests for emergency help, so by Miðsumar we had given away our complete stock of food. I estimate that each family receives approximately \$100 worth of food each month; often double that when we see a need.



On June 22nd, after a Facebook announcement by Sierra Chapman saying we still had food, 54 people jumped on with smiley emojis, hearts, and 22 comments – all positive.

From Yoland Mc: "Thank you so very much for helping, not just us but the whole community. My husband and I were down to flour and salt. Thank you and blessings to you and yours."

Miðsumar at Óðinshof - Nine years and Counting

Since the purchase of the old Grange Hall, now known as Óðinshof, we've gathered for over 100 monthly events. But it is Miðsumar that draws people from across the country. Weddings and baby namings have taken place, but in the year of 2025, our celebration would center on the AFA itself—its 30th Anniversary.

Leaders who came from other states included Goði Nathan and Folkbuilder Ashley Erlandson from Minnesota, Goði Jonathan Rock from Indiana, Folkbuilder Alexander Casto from Florida, Folkbuilder Ryan Harlan from Montana, and Folkbuilder Lou Nickerson from Arizona. We also had members and guests from OH, PA, DE, NH, WI, CO, AZ, NV, ID, and OR. In the end, AFA family and friends numbered 112.

Work Weekends, led by Daniel saw the finish of our impressive, highly functional kitchen, completion of a new septic system, and the installation of a new HVAC system that allows us to maintain comfortable temperatures throughout the year. For visual impact, the Odom family created two huge red and blue balloon-arches to decorate our Hof. Miðsumar bouquets in white and yellow, along with vines of sunflowers decorated the tables.

We always extend the event to Thursday for those who make the long distance trip. Folkbuilders Sierra Chapman and Alexander Casto arrived early to prep meals and greet everyone with a warm welcome when they arrived. The feeling of "coming home" is immediately felt by everyone who meets Sierra. While occupied in the kitchen, she

always keeps her eye on the needs of all, from the youngest to the oldest.

At least twenty people gathered for the Friday morning's food blessing. The day began with the Valkyrie's Prayer, first sung by Dan McDonald of Colorado, and then recited by all, facing Sunna with arms outstretched. Throughout the day, our numbers would increase until all eight tables at dinner were fully filled. Miðsumar had officially begun.

Greeting the Gods, led by Allsherjargoði Matt Flavel, is our first use of our highly admired ritual circle. The Holy Powers are invited to join us, then all celebrants in the circle state their names over the drinking horn while hailing one of the Æsir. It's a beautiful AFA tradition. We depart the circle by entering the Hall, specifically to acknowledge Óðinn before his mural and "hail" his presence.

The day included an outstanding Mead-making presentation by the McDonald family of Colorado and a heartfelt talk by Founder McNallen that ended with the reading of a skaldic-style poem about the siege of the Alamo called the *Death of Bowie Gizaardsbane*. Guitar music by Paul Stevens is always played during our evening meals, adding more pleasure to our delicious dinners.

The perfect evening drew many outdoors but those who remained in the Hall were presented with a slideshow created by me featuring photos from the earliest days of the AFA in 1994 up through the purchase and beginning of the Hof in 2015. I enjoy sharing dramatic stories of our past and how we came to be here. That journey is the Örlög we all share here at the 30th year of the AFA.

In the deep twilight, we re-entered the ritual space for the Allsherjargoði's Oðinn Blót. Torches and bonfire marked this sacred space where we intoned runes, sang the Herjarfather chant, and "Hailed Óðinn" as we exchanged our gifts with him. The day was officially done; Saturday would be our official Miðsumar.

Following breakfast, I led all who wished to honor Mother Frigg to the Goddess Circle, kept verdant by Hof Steward Odom through the dry month of June. The serenity of this place beckoned as we approached and encircled the Freyja pole. My message during the Frigg Blót was to recognize in the family triad of Óðinn, Frigg, and Baldr, family unity and the love and duty of parents to their children. Our request for Frigg was to watch over our families and guide us well in our relationships.

Mid-morning was Ladies' Tea time and the Men's Moot. The women returned to the kitchen-sitting room where we chatted about our goals at this midpoint in the year., The men were likewise engaged in conversation with input from our leaders. The Q&A

session later in the day brought forth some great questions and responses from the Allsherjargoði about changes in the AFA this past year plus more general questions.

Miðsumar Games included a tug-a-war with a chain, but most exciting was the contest to pick up and carry a huge boulder weighing 115 pounds. Men, women, and even kids took part in this spectacle. Those who had the strength to master the Hof Rock Challenge made it a great show with lots of memorable moments. Following this, I led a children's Sumbl in the Goddess Circle with many sweet words including memories of departed pets that mean so much to our little ones.

The Miðsumar Blót to Baldr was led by Goði Nathan Erlandson. Though it was late afternoon, the torches and bonfire were lit as four ladies stood near the fire, at the cardinal directions, each with a horn of mead in hand. This honor was given to Gyðja Lauren Anderson, Folkbuilders Ashley Erlandson and Sierra Chapman, as well as myself. The rune Sowilo was invoked, Baldr summoned, and the traditional sunwheel set afire by Hof Steward Odom. It was an intense Blót; a beautifully orchestrated ritual with the addition of the ladies.

Our evening feast of pork loin roast and tasty side dishes was many faceted. At one point, Gyðja Lauren Anderson joined Paul Stevens in a song called *Noble Ways* by our very own Folkbuilder Ryan Skinner. This was followed by a rousing rendition of *Take Me Home Country Roads* with everyone singing along. Auction time was near, but first the special 30-year Anniversary cake was brought in candles alight for Steve and me to blow out.

Then it was time to acknowledge some very special members of our AFA family. One man has stood out for his kindness and generous spirit – Knute Allmendinger. He received a certificate that featured his family crest, given with our thanks for decades of devotion. The second certificate went to the Sutherland family – Olivia and Brodie, who have given so much to Óðinshof. They've been innovative in suggesting improvements, with the development of Thorgrun's Grove last summer as one of their big projects. They also gave much love and support in the planning of Thorgrun's memorial last August. Their certificate features the Sutherland coat-of-arms with the family motto "No Fear."

Goði Jon Rock stepped up as auctioneer with much wit and laughter woven throughout the hours-long process. The auction featured wood carvings, art prints, an 8x10 foot wall-hanging of the Óðinn mural commissioned by Monk LaSan, painted rocks by the children, plus lots of AFA memorabilia. When we were through, the AFA made close to \$4000 from the generosity of our Folk.

By10:30, the Folk filtered back into the Hall that was transformed and ready for Sumbl. Sitting in a darkened room lit by candlelight, many participated for the very first time. For the next two hours, impassioned words, deep memories and holy names were spoken over the horn. Hail Óðinn in his Hall!

The last event of the weekend was the Wayfarers' Blot Sunday morning. Goði Jon Rock officiated this one in a very nurturing ceremony. Hammers and various amulets were placed on our altar stone and blessed by the mighty Þórr for our journeys – wherever they'd take us. At the very end, we gave the farewell hugs that have become standard at Miðsumar. I felt dazed by the weekend, standing there with Folk who came to mean so much to us in only three days. The blessings imparted by Goði Rock can still be felt. Hail the Folk! Hail the AFA!







As Winter Solstice came upon us in the Southern Hemisphere this June, a couple of us here in AFA Australia gathered to hold our very first Blót.


Though small, this humble gathering marked an important step - the first formal AFA







Obstacles in Montana



This past spring, a friend and fellow kindred member said he was planning on running a Spartan Race. A couple weeks later he sent me a text saying that he was all signed up. The gauntlet had been thrown and it was time for me to sign up! We got another member of our kindred to join up and, since three is company, our team was formed.




The capitalistic and individualistic nature of the event was made evident from registration to race day itself. While the race was promoted as something the legendary Romans and Spartans were capable of, there were never-ending ways to spend additional money. This is best highlighted at the event grounds where everybody, racer and spectator alike, was funneled into the merchandise tent with no alternative way around. Spectators had to cough up \$25 dollars a head just to watch their loved one's race. Don't want to run with your phone or wallet? Here is a convenient locker that can be rented! Attendees were surrounded by purchasable trinkets, military recruiters, and a culture boiled down to an advertising gimmick with some Hollywood references thrown in for good measure.



Despite all of these drawbacks, I still managed to enjoy myself. Our race was on June 22nd and was a 5k in length with 20 obstacles, almost 7 obstacles per mile. Jumping walls, pulling ropes, climbing various structures, carrying sandbags, and various monkey bar contraptions all had an added challenge in the nonstop rain at temperatures around 38°F and slick mud covering every surface. One had to be quick or think outside the box to navigate the obstacles with unavoidable cold hands.



At the end of the day, I was glad to have gone out with two of my kindred brothers. An obstacle course is going to try anyone's physical abilities, but the weather presented a psychological barrier as well. These trials can be overcome by an individual, but confronting them as a team helps lighten the load. It is good, healthy, and necessary to improve ourselves as individuals, yet this truth can be overly focused upon in the hyper-individualistic society we find ourselves in. Remembering that you are part of a team, a part of our racial community, a member (or future member) of the AFA makes a significant difference. We improve ourselves to be valuable teammates, to be both capable in and of ourselves, and to assist those of us in need of help. We are at our best when we face obstacles, whether physical or mental, together.



The Spartan Race lacked any aspect of mutual cooperation. But that did not stop the three of us from helping one another where we could. We ran together, made sure we completed the obstacles before moving on, and checked in with each other as a team. In total disregard to whatever our individual times could have been, we started and finished together. When it was all said and done, I was glad the three of us went through the race together. I was also thankful for the other members of our kindred that decided to come out and cheer us on from the crowd. The time we spent with one another in the mud and the rain only strengthened our bonds. By no means do you have

to run a Spartan Race too, but I strongly encourage you all to meaningfully spend time with people in person to build upon the foundations of a solid community.

I will be keeping you all updated on our move, but I will also start reaching out to you all and start getting to know you better. We're very excited to be moving out, and I for







Last Will and Testament

Recently, several members of our AFA family have passed beyond the veil. One was an old man in ill health, two were young men in the prime of life... all died with no legal will on record.
