


<u>Freyshof Fund – Asatru Folk Assembly (runestone.org)</u>



Day of Remembrance

Goði Ölvir of Egg | March 9th



Goði Ölvir of Egg, who lived in the early 11th century and died in 1021, was a Goði in the region of Trondheim, Norway. Since this story takes place 20 years after Olaf Tryggvason was deposed, Christianization was all but complete in Norway. The Norwegians still remaining faithful to the Æsir did so in secrecy, as they would be tortured and killed if they were discovered.

King Olaf II of Norway, often referred to as "Saint Olaf," began to hear rumors of Ásatrú gatherings in Ölvir's region of Trondheim. As the Goði of the area, Ölvir was sent to appear before the king and explain himself on two separate occasions. Both times, he carefully convinced Olaf that these were not Ásatrú gatherings, but simply great feasts and secular community events. Olaf appeared convinced, but told some of his spies to keep an eye on Trondheim and Ölvir.

Olaf's spies later informed him that an Ostara gathering was being prepared in Trondheim, and the king had heard enough. He set out with five ships and 300 men towards Trondheim. They arrived in the dark, and successfully ambushed Ölvir and all of his Folk brave enough to have kept their Troth to the Æsir. Ölvir and many of his people were tortured and killed, stamping out Ásatrú for the next 900 years.

Ölvir's story is inspiring in a way different than those of Goði Rauðr the Strong or King Redbad of Frisia. Ölvir unfortunately had to hide his people's love and worship of the Æsir, and he had to lie to Olaf for the good of his Folk. Since our Folk have always been a noble people, we do not like to be dishonest or hear that our heroes have ever been dishonest. However, it's important to remember that the Hávamál tells us to repay kindness with kindness, but to also repay treachery with treachery.

Ölvir was not deceiving a friend, or even a good man, but a despotic king pushing a foreign faith on his own subjects. Ölvir lied for the good of his Folk, and for their dedication to the Æsir, and would then go right back to being proudly Ásatrú and officiating rituals for his community. His piety and devotion never wavered, and even when hiding his Ásatrú from the murderous king, he adhered to advice given to us by the All-Father.

Let this tale be an inspiring one to all of our Folk, so that we may be Ásatrú even when it's inconvenient!





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AFA Prison Ministry



The importance of this AFA Prison Ministry is so much more than just for those who are actually incarcerated, it benefits not only them as followers of Asatru but their families and loved ones on the outside as they will see the noticeable change in their demeanor and demand that our faith commands for them to lead a noble life. We all are future ancestors and will help them be examples of our faith and not be a burden or a product of recidivism.

We are compiling letters from prisoners that are Educational, Empowering, and Encouraging along with special spiritual writings from our Gothar to create a quarterly newsletter to be distributed to inmates, institutions, and jails. Our mission is not about providing free books or literature to bored prisoners who simply want free stuff. We intend on making real-world change for the better of our folk.

""No packed rooms in the prisons; in each institution I have only a few people; occasionally about a dozen, but 5-6 is more common. I certainly do not want the Fellowship to be a club for cons, or ex-cons; the advantage is that when in prison the inmates have time to discuss and digest what they read, a point that often is lost to people on the outside in the hubbub of daily concerns" - Else Christensen

By the example of our Folkmother, Else Christensen, we will also be going into prisons as we are able to. Some of our Gothar and other leadership, will be going into the prisons to hold study groups, lead blot, and encourage continued growth in the folk inside.

Or if you'd like to donate to this ministry, there's a donation earmark set up on our site <u>here</u>. The donations will be used to get small ritual items and books into the prisons and the hands of our Folk inside.

Ancestral Food and Culture



This month, I am featuring two recipes. One from Folkuilder Ryan Harlan and his wife Rachel out of Óðinshof district, and one from Þórshof member Angela Gurrisi.

Folkbuilder Ryan Harlan's Venison Steak Smothered in Onions



- 2lbs venison steak, cut 1 inch thick
- 2 large onions, sliced
- Flour, garlic powder, onion powder, salt, pepper, paprika
- Butter and oil to sauté onions
- Sliced mushrooms
- 1 cup water
- Beef bouillon
- Worcestershire sauce

Roll steaks in seasoned flour. Heat butter and oil in heavy skillet. Sauté onions in butter and oil. Add mushrooms and sauté until soft. Set aside. Brown meat on both sides, cooking until medium-rare. Let rest. Add 2 heaped teaspoons of flour to juice in pan to make a roux. Add bouillon to make a gravy. Season to taste. Add few dashes of Worcestershire sauce. Add mushrooms and onions to the gravy. Serve on or with your steaks.

Angela Gurrisi's Great Grandma Smith's Krum Kaka



Angela sent me her grandmother's recipe book and the cover written in sharpie said page 13!! I scroll over to page 13 and there are notes all around this recipe saying, "This is the one!" So, I figure what better recipe to share than one that brings excitement! I will attach a photo of Krum Kaka and will be attempting this later this month.

- 4 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 cup flour
- 1tsp vanilla
- 1 cup cornstarch
- 1/2 cup melted butter
- 1/3 cup cream

Tools:

- Krum Kaka iron (for authenticity but I'm sure if you had something similar it would work just the same)
- wooden dowl for rolling once cooked


Begin by beating 4 eggs, 1 cup sugar and vanilla together. Once creamed add in 1/2 cup butter and 1/4 cup cream until combined. In a separate bowl, sift 1 cup flour and 1 cup cornstarch. Slowly add into mixture beating until fully incorporated.

Drop large teaspoon full onto iron and let cook. Ensure iron does not get too hot. Once cooked remove from heat and use wooden dowel to roll into shape whilst still hot. Fill with whatever you desire; whipped cream and fruit seeming to be the most common. Enjoy!

Baby Tracker









Sister's Egg Project



It is time once again to begin our Sister's Egg group exercise and practice. We encourage all our AFA ladies to participate. Bringing women home to the AFA is the focus of this exercise and project.





- Step 1: Hollow out an egg. Small hole in the top, larger hole in the bottom. Blow out the inside of the egg. Rinse out well and let dry.
- Step 2: Decorate the egg with imagery you associate with the AFA and our sisters. This can be as simple or as intricate as you choose. Galdr, chant, or sing a rune or sequence of runes as you do this. The Folk Kom Hem chant would also be appropriate.
- Step 3: Write the goal you wish to manifest in this case, "Sisters, come home" on to a piece of paper that you can roll up and place inside the egg. Meditate with this intention in your hands, see your sister's coming home to the AFA. When done, roll up and place inside the egg.
- Step 4: Fill this egg with herbs, flowers, or other things you feel appropriate. I will be using dried roses, crushed pine incense, rosemary, and lavender. Use what works well for you!
- Step 5: Seal the egg. Using glue and small piece of cartstock, cardboard or even a coin, seal up the bottom of the egg.
- Step 6: Create a sacred "nest" or designated place on your Altar for this work.
- Step 7: Each day, hold the egg (or the nest if you choose to do several) and sit with this work. Focus your energy and will on the success of each goal. See the process of it happening to successful completion.
- Step 8: During your May Day celebration, crack open this egg and offer it to the ritual fire (bury in offering space if fire option is not available). Release your intention and will that you have grown and nurtured into Midgard.



Food Pantry at Óðinshof



Our pickup day at the interfaith Food Ministry happened to be one of the last heavy rains of the season. With our volume of food down about 40% due to current shortages, it didn't take very long to fill our vehicle. Ready to hit the road, a quick glance showed we had a very flat tire on our minivan. Our vehicle was not designed for flat tires though, so our call for AAA roadside help would take a chunk of our day. In the end, the punctured tire was replaced with a used one at a total cost of \$50. There are some bargains in California!

To simplify our food pantry processes, the cases of food stayed inside the van until Saturday evening when everything was brought indoors for quick bagging. Now, with winter illnesses abated, the good turnout for Charming of the Plow also meant we had great staffing for this month's food pantry.

Our food offerings were simple again, primarily a small assortment of canned goods. As expected, we were greeted by the early line-up of cars, but after that rush, we were back to clusters of cars in intervals. It didn't feel like we had as many families, but in the end, we offered food to 58 households representing 167 individuals. The need for our charity services continues; the same for each of our four Hofs. Hail the Asatru Folk Assembly!

After lunch, sisters gathered in the hall for our Ladies' Tea (we have a virtual one every first Friday of the month, you are welcome to join us!). There was a wide variety of tasty teas to choose from, as well as cookies and cakes to enjoy with it. In honor of the spiritual significance of Charming of the Plow, we shared some of our goals for the year with each other, planting the seeds of our intentions, looking forward to a successful harvest of the fruits of our industriousness. We passed around a get well soon card for Katie Thompson, and filled it with our love and best wishes for her healing and recovery.



While the ladies shared tea, the dulcet sounds of a chainsaw rang out behind the Hof... it was Folkbuilder Ryan Skinner and our menfolk gathering for their own bonding activities together, armed with wheelbarrows, wrangling valiantly with a fallen tree that needed to be cleared. They got so much done, thank you brothers! Victory was had, and good conversation and laughter as well.






The children had many activities to enjoy. There was Valentine's Day-themed art to do, and exciting things to learn about! Through the story of The Elves and the Shoemaker, Gyðja McNallen taught them lessons about the Landvættir and the significance of exchanging gifts. They did artwork about this, painting pictures of what they thought the Landvættir look like, then left the art as an offering to them. The children also had a special Sumbl of their own outside. They toured the garden and cemetery as well, spending some time honoring our Folk there, like our beloved Goði Thorgrun Odden. A wonderful time was had by all, as always.



The weather was lovely, and as the afternoon passed into the evening, dinner preparations were started in the kitchen. Folk gathered around the fire outside and in the hall for Frith and fellowship. Gyðja McNallen talked to the folk in the hall about the story of our Ásynja Gefjon, whom we honor during Charming of the Plow. The sunny skies had darkened into cool-shadowed evening, and folk gathered outside for a Blót to mark this holy day. Led by our Allsherjargoði, we honored Freyr, and blessed the plow. Earlier, we all had decorated small cakes with our names and runes, and we placed them in the fire during the ritual. It was a beautiful Blót, certain to remain in the hearts and minds of the participants.



We proceeded into the hall for a group photo and feasting. Dinner was pulled pork, Greek salad, baked potatoes, and baked beans, with a variety of pies for dessert. We had the pleasure of musical accompaniment for the feast from our talented brother Paul. Laughter filled the air as we shared food, stories, and companionship, solidifying that sense of belonging that is so vital to our spiritual journey. There was a cash raffle afterwards, and as the evening wound down and folk began to depart for home, bags were prepared for the food pantry the following day. 58 families were helped by the Óðinshof food pantry in the month of February!



As the evening grew later, Folk who remained gathered outside around the fire for holy Sumbl, sharing toasts and stories over the horn. In the future, starting with our Ostara gathering, we will be holding Sumbl before dinner, so more of our folk will be able to experience this holy rite with us. The day had drawn to a close, and it certainly was a wonderful day. New friendships were forged, old acquaintances were renewed, and the sense of community deepened. We were reminded of the importance of coming together, sharing our experiences, and supporting one another on our spiritual path. The success of the gathering is a testament to the dedication and spirit of our brothers and

sisters of the faith, and the strength of our church. We in Óðinshof leadership extend our heartfelt thanks to all who contributed to making Charming of the Plow a memorable and meaningful experience. We look forward to future gatherings and the continued growth of our faith community.

Hof Steward's Address



Good day Óðinsfolk. Today I would like to bring you some updates on the goings on around the Hof, and to let you in on some of the ideas, planning, and goals for this year. My intent is to present to you a list of projects; either ongoing, or upcoming, and that you would want to be involved with one, or several of them. So I'll just jump right in.

I typically divide the year into two halves: Midsummer prep and Yule prep. When one event ends, prep for the next begins. This is mostly due to the fact that projects take time, money, and volunteers. As I have said in the past, the more volunteers we have at a Work Weekend, means the more time I have to dedicate to projects. As February comes to a close, here is a look at my Midsummer prep list.

- Men's restroom update The men of Óðinshof were able to raise a couple bucks to make some much needed changes to the men's bathroom. We will be installing a new sliding window, a vent fan with duct work, as well as replacing the wood paneling currently on the walls. (Complete by June 1st.)
- Kitchen floor We now have a new kitchen island, and therefore we will be installing the last of the new flooring. (Complete by March 8-9)
- Hall decor While we continue to streamline the operations at the Hof, one thing we find ourselves in need of is quality seasonal decor. Table runners, candles, table cloths, center pieces etc. The Hof will rotate these decorations by the seasons. Summer, Fall, Winter, and Spring. Summer and Fall decor is currently lacking, and if you wish to get involved in the creation or contribution to this decor, please let me know. We currently have a member working on Spring table runners, while my wife and I have made pieces for Winter. (Completion is ongoing)
- Freyja Pole To those wishing to contribute to our Freyja Pole and her ritual circle, please reach out. I have installed a new sprinkler system for her, as well as seeded the area with grass and wild flower seed. Intent is to add fruit bearing trees (x2), flower boxes, and bench seating. (Completion is ongoing)
- Outdoors Large Planter box. We will be demolishing the steel and wooden structures around the BBQ pit, leaving only the moss-covered cinder blocks. This will be turned into a large, well maintained flower bed, with a dedication plaque in the center. Anyone wishing to contribute to soil, bulbs, or has skills in designing or creating a centerpiece(wood/stone) should reach out. (Completion by May 1st) Additionally, bench seating is needed for the property. If you or someone you know is able to build a decent bench, large enough for 2-3 people, I would encourage you to do so. I can paint, stain, or seal them as needed. The more benches the better. Hint: YouTube is full of DIY pallet, and inexpensive 2x6 bench builds. Check it out. (Completion by June 1st)
- Plumbing upgrade Currently we have a handful of members drawing up plans for a new leech field. During Midsummer 2024, with the increased usage of the facilities, we noticed the ground had become saturated in water. After digging around a bit, we found that our leech field had been crushed, compacted, and mangled with tree roots. I am currently waiting for a materials list, and I expect to move forward with this soon. (Complete by April 12)

There are many other small projects, good ideas, needs, and wants. If you have something in mind, or would like to sponsor a specific project on my list, please let me know. And to be completely honest, I would rather our members make an ugly bench, a


simple coat rack, or some cheap Hof aprons for the kitchen staff, than to have us buy plastic stuff from overseas. I want people to see a Hof maintained, and built by its members. I myself, have "churched up" a few of my own ugly pieces for the Hof, and they end up looking great. So, if you'd like a crack at contributing something of your own, don't worry about skill level or know how. We can put some lipstick on an ugly homemade project together. I look forward to hearing from you, and I'll see you in the next Runestone.





Discipline is Freedom



There was a time when I felt weighed down, not just by my body, but by the quiet doubts in my mind, but I knew I could be better. I could be stronger. I could be happier.

So, I made a choice. Not to deprive. Not to punish myself. But to live in a way that made me burn it to earn it.

I walk, I hike, I stay in motion because my body was made to move, to climb, and to explore. Each step reminds me that I am capable, that I am worthy of the effort. When my muscles burn and my breath quickens, I know I have earned my rest.

From Óðinshof to Njörðshof; a Blótferð



Seeing a different Hof or any Hof in general is on many people's "bucket lists," and one that has been on mine for a while. I had a great year at work and ended up with an end of year bonus. Strangely enough, I'm somebody who doesn't like having "extra" money. I have enough to take care of my family and my kids and go into saving for the kids. Anything "extra" that I can't see an immediate need for usually goes into the Asatru Folk Assembly because I can't think of anything more important to spend the money on. My children have everything they could ever need and more; we have a roof over our head, clothes on our backs, food in our bellies, and reliable transportation. Anything outside of this is frivolous spending on material items that would really mean nothing

to me or my children 5 years down the line.

So, with this bonus, I was trying to think of what I could do with it. I put a decent amount away for the children, but I decided this time I would indulge a bit and spend some money on myself. Something I HARDLY do. I began researching flights and found a very affordable round-trip ticket to Orlando and decided that I WILL be going to Njörðshof for the national event, Charming of the Plow. I booked the flight, booked the room, and began the anxious count down.

You can say "if you've seen one church, you've seen them all" but that's not accurate when it comes to the Hofs. Each Hof is dedicated to a different God who brings different things to the table, thus bringing a different culture about it. I know (and love) Óðinshof culture but had no idea what to expect from Njörðshof. Do they do outdoor Blót? Do they spend all night around the fire pit? How is their kitchen set up? (Can you tell where my happy place is, haha.)

I set out early Thursday morning to begin my travels, and when I checked in online, I got a special offer to upgrade to first class. I figured why not? I never spend money on myself and this trip is as good of a time as any to indulge upon myself. I settle in the very fist seat on the plane—1A, a window seat with plenty of space on either side of me and a wall to put my feet up on. I get handed a mimosa and the party begins. Folks began filing onto the plane and I kept an eye out for the McNallens lighting up with glee when I saw them and surprising them by seeing me "sitting like a queen." I shared a seat with a gentleman on his way to Florida to take care of his elderly mother and we spoke about ancestors and the importance of making sure our elders' final years are spent in comfort so when they pass beyond the veil, they do so in peace.

We land (safely, hooray!) in Florida and I'm so focused on getting the McNallens situated. I don't stop to take in what's around me. Alexander is waiting at the car; my first time meeting my lovely boyfriend in person, and instead of greeting him with "hello" I sit down in the seat, after getting the McNallens taken care of, turn to him, try to speak and get gagged from how thick the air is. My first words to him were "I can chew the air. Get me out of here now before I turn around and jump back on a plane." We laugh and begin our drive to the Hof. The air gets much thinner as soon as we leave Orlando (thankfully! I wouldn't have survived). Three hours of driving and many laughs later, we pull into the driveway of Njörðshof.

As soon as our wheels touched the driveway, an electric tingle shot through my body and a sense of calm washed over me. I turn to Alexander and proclaim, "I am Home. The power of Njörðr is pulsing through this land." We get inside and the hall, as modest

as it may be comparatively to other Hofs, was not modest in greatness. The sense of pride these folks have in the Hof is felt throughout the walls when even minimal membership is present. The echos of laughter from the children building Frith and strengthening Hamingja paint the walls leaving the feeling behind even after they have turned in for the night. We have leadership Sumbl and prepare ourselves for the weekend ahead. I like to say as leadership our goal is that we could have a million fires going but membership won't be privy to one of them. Well, I'm proud to say there wasn't even a single fire we had to put out. The camaraderie and togetherness and teamwork Njörðshof has not just among leadership but among Folk as well is unmatched and made for a very smooth event.

We had a beautiful baby shower for Madison East that I was honored to be a part of; as well as Alexander Casto taking his Folkbuilder oath. Two major events that were very impactful for me as Madison is someone who means a lot to me and to be able to celebrate her bringing new life into this world was something I will hold near and dear to my heart forever more. Getting to stand with my fellow leadership and watch Alexander take the full plunge into leadership and be Oathbound to all of us present is beyond words. A man who truly puts his all into his Folk with very little asked in return. He is an embodiment of what the Asatru Folk Assembly looks for in a Folkbuilder.

We had Njörðr Blót, and with each hail Njörðr, I got this tingling numb feeling going down my body and tears began to flow as the power of the great Njörðr within that hall was oozing out. The auction was lots of fun and I came out with WAY more bowls made by the ever-talented Gilbert Page than I intended too (but I'm not mad, I'll find a place for them ②).

The Gift-Cycle we do with the Gods is very much something beneficial and rewarding on its own, but when we can make others apart of the Gift-Cycle with us, it just brings much more fulfillment to it in my eyes.

The last day was filled with Alexander and me getting there early and cleaning up before Wayfarers Blót and breakfast, which was done deliciously by the beautiful Pam

McCloskey who kicked butt all weekend in the broom closet excuse of a kitchen. Us ladies who dedicate our time to making sure our folks are fed during national events deserve all the praise but a special shout out to Pam is much deserved as she makes do with what she has and you would have never guessed for a second that the amount and quality of food was done in a small kitchen or prepped weeks in advance in her home; she truly made many sacrifices leading up to the event and we are forever grateful.

The event ended with leadership and an additional member going to St. Augustine for a Ásatrú Academy field trip where we learned all about gators and crocodiles. We even saw some dinosaurs! After watching the gators do their feeding, we were hungry ourselves, so we moseyed on down to a local restaurant where we had some delicious food and some great laughter and said our goodbyes. Feast Of The Winter King: Colorado Rocky Mountains









Waking the Bear




At Fólkvangr, we understand the winter. With standing temperatures in the negative forties and wind chill stripping another ten to twenty degrees, the cold finds its home at ours. Snow builds up in large drifts and many roads become impassable. Failure to prepare for winter comes with a heavy price and the season is long. It's fair to say there is a good deal of hibernation that takes place out here.




This is why when the thaw begins and the rivers rise, tens of feet spewing two-foot-thick ice chunks downstream in a swirling orchestra, everything changes. And it changes violently. Rafts of ice twenty feet long barrel down the river and break against the bridge. Streams of runoff cascade down the hills and canyon walls into coulees. Deer break from the woods to greedily feed on exposed grass while wolves stalk behind to feed the heavy lane she-wolves that prepare for a new litter. What's more is the silence of the frost ends and out springs the choir of birds of all varieties. So long has silence covered the valley and so swift the return of the winged minstrels that the sound

is shocking in its vibrant return. Even the sunrise and setting light become more sharp and less muted from the glowing snow-bound land. Muddy footprints race this way and that as small animals emerge. Foxes and rabbits dance. The land erupts into movement and color. This is where animals move about like the wandering minstrels of old. This is the spring arrival I know when I emerge from my proverbial cave.



When I emerge from winter, I take part in what I call the waking of the bear. I know that after a long winter there is much to be done to prepare for the next; that there is limited time for industry and the plow before the deadening of the land returns.

Seeds must be blessed, after their frost blanketed rest.


The plow must be honed, fields to be combed.

With the thaw arriving, we must mirror the bear as he mirrors the cosmic force of the year cycle. We must emerge from our slumber and take to the fields. The bear takes on an essential revival of the earth as life bursts forth. Pórr is associated with the bear and holds the same name as those honey eaters; that is, Bjorn.

As Adam of Bremen accounts, Pórr plays a controlling hand in much for the success of crops, the weather and nature. Indeed, while Freyr holds the pivotal spot in our celebrations and worship of Charming of the Plow. We see that many, too, look to Pórr for their sowing's success as well. They seek Pórr's favor and the bears are said to aid him in this endeavor.



Bears upon exiting hibernation seek berries and other seedy plants for quick energy as they roam about their territories looking for prey and signs of disturbance in their lands.


As they do, their scat spreads winter stay-over seeds so that they may grow in early summers' fertile glow. This idea of the bear spreading life after winter and being associated with crops was best seen in Sweden where they say they see the "grain-bear" when wind blows through fields of wheat stocks. It is seen as the spirit of the bear guiding the field for Þórr.




In this way we must emulate the Friend of Man: by bringing life and order into the world reborn from winter's grasp. We must plan out our endeavors and manifest our will into reality.
