Words from our Founder

The AFA Needs Men to Further Our Folk!



Those of you born in the last few decades have inherited a world which, despite all the gimmicks, distractions, and novelties, all the illusions of freedom and "progress," we are living in what Friedrich Nietzsche called "the great down-going."

Entertainment? Easily found. Pointless distraction? Even more so.

Truth and idealism? Rare, devalued. Love of the ancestors and their values? Largely forgotten. And above all - loyalty to, and identification with, our Folk? This has been cast as the greatest offense of all.

The public and political world in which we live is one where the ways of our ancestors - and those of us who admire them - are hateful...and possibly criminal.

We live at the end of an age; we face a time when chaos rules, when the natural order is dismissed, when ideals are cast out and the crass and unworthy win the adulation of the masses. We have only to look at the popular culture (so called) and the daily news for examples. The trash and trivia you will see there cannot, and must not, go on.

We must seek a return, a revival, a renaissance of that which is noble, idealistic, and uplifting. Traditionally, great men and those good men who support and follow them, are the ones who have brought about such a rebirth. William Wallace was an example. Tolkien wrote stories about such heroes; men who took up arms because it was their destiny and their duty, and who were followed by other armed men because those men recognized them for what they were and fought alongside them. It was better to fight and to die rather than submit to evil.

Our modern society is oblivious to such idealism. We are ruled by bandits and sellouts, by politicians who "make deals" and who openly accept money from evil organizations to ensure their re-election. Their crimes, and our decadent toleration of them, stinks to the heavens.

We need men. Not simulations of men, not gender-bending imitations of men, but MEN. Men who will "do right and fear no one." Men who will "put it all on the line." Men with testosterone, and idealism, and an understanding of our role in history. (It should go without saying that this in no way reduces the role of our women; hail to them! - but I'm talking to the men now.)

We - you and I - are fortunate in that we belong to one of the few organizations that address our current situation. We must do our part. No, I am not referring to taking up arms against the government. We are fighting this battle by other means.

We need men who can build families, support them, and protect them in good times and bad. We need men who can speak well enough to explain our religion and beliefs to others. We need men with the social skills to work well with the men and women of the AFA.

We need men who do not abuse alcohol or drugs.

We need men who love, defend, and support our Gods, our Folk, and the reputation of the AFA.

We need men who will actively promote and help build the AFA.

...Looking for heroism? There it is, right on your doorstep. You were meant to stand with us and fight this battle for the heart, the soul, the very existence of our Folk. The AFA is not "just another organization," it's your church, your connection with the divine. A hundred years from now, our descendants will raise a toast in your honor. It is said that "only the forgotten are dead"...you will not be forgotten.



Words from Our Goðar

Declaration of Purpose VII



VII. The use of science and technology for the well-being of our people, while protecting and working in harmony with the natural environment in which we live

Technology and science are part of our intellectual inheritance, and we can use them to make life better for ourselves and our children. We must use our abilities wisely, however, maintaining the balance of the natural world from which we sprang. We modern Ásatrúar do not repudiate the scientific and technological progress of our Folk for the last thousand years. Even the Vikings themselves were technologically adept for their time. We do acknowledge man's ability today to change the world around us – for better or worse. Our knowledge must be applied in a way that is not harmful to the environment in which we live, for the Earth is our mother and – while we retain free will and individuality – we are a part of the web of life.

Technology is a double-edged sword. We are part of a race that has been largely responsible for advancements in nearly all areas of life as we know it, maybe except for inventing peanut butter. If our ancestors weren't as innovative and intelligent as they were, we would have never ventured from our geographical origins. We'd be stuck where we started still living with a primitive mindset preventing us from becoming more than we were the day before. Because of our innovative and exploring nature we have conquered nearly all areas of the world religion aside. We embrace new profound ideas and ways of doing things that still align with our traditional beliefs and values. So, we've built skyscrapers, been to the moon, explored the bottom of the oceans, created healthier ways of living, and all relatively quickly. The responsibility of an advanced race is to measure out the benefits and detriments of the scientific breakthroughs so as not to alienate Mother Earth. Mistakes have been made along the way as would be expected since the wisdom gained from acknowledging and correcting them is what enables us to keep pushing beyond perceived boundaries and to striver to be as the Æsir are, a never-ending endeavor that we as a race welcome. We are not meant to be still running around in furs and swinging axes and anyone that says otherwise is a fool and will get left behind in the abyss of mediocrity with a primitive mindset. It is all about balance, taking strides forward with a responsibility to our male and female children and to our Mother Earth.

Hail the Heroes of Ásatrú that paved the way! Hail the Asatru Folk Assembly! Hail the Æsir!






<u>Freyshof Fund – Asatru Folk Assembly (runestone.org)</u>



Life so easily gets busy, and the whirlwind leaves us reeling. Simply trying to keep up with all the tasks and having overloaded schedules means that many families end up having a dynamic of reacting, rather than responding. This impacts all aspects of our lives, our marriages, our parenting. So much of the life wisdom I have gained thus far has been about being intentional and making extra space in the day for things to happen. This allows for purposeful feedback and action and a lot more peace. Along with that, routines can be extremely helpful. I do not advocate for being beholden to a routine but finding the balance of structure with the opportunities for spontaneous delight. A huge part of the Waldorf philosophy is Rhythm.

"Rhythm" isn't a fluffy, new age word for "schedule" - I promise. It is a gentle (and sometimes not so gentle) breathing in and out. Many Waldorf resources would have you think that rhythm is just about deciding what day you will bake bread and which day you will do laundry. Rhythm of the home is much deeper than this. It is about holding the space. What does that mean? It means that you are emotionally able to approach the day and your child. This carries into your rhythm and further into how you live and what attitudes you bring to your child...

Holding the space is the simple act of being present. Simple and easy are not the same thing! The more rest you get and the more you are conscious about how you show up, the easier it will be. Let's think back about the last time you were distracted by your phone or a book or adult conversation. Did your children get crazy? Did someone get hurt or the dog chose then to mess on the floor or you stubbed your toe? See, the moment you dialed the phone or hopped on social media to post that picture, your energy was no longer with your children and they felt it. They crave the security that comes from you being present and connected with your family. Holding the space is something that comes gradually as you become more confident about Waldorf, more connected to your children and more sure about your path. Give yourself time, but flex those muscles daily. When you do your part, you will find that the children will do theirs as well. Peace will abound. Of course there are times when it is stressful or you are tired or sick, fill-in-the-blank, but on the whole, a happy parent will make for a happy home.

One of the lovely concepts I have come across in many homeschool programs is the idea of Morning Circle. It was a way to start off the day that was connected and grounding. After eating breakfast, parent and children would gather to do some group activities. They would begin by reading a holy story, discussing a verse or talking about a religious holiday. This could also be a good time for read aloud chapter books while younger hands work on crafts. Some families combine close ages for certain subjects.

Taking this time together sets the pace for the day that is meaningful, together and creates bonds.





I recommend you start your day with intention, perhaps a special morning routine where you gather at a family altar, say a prayer together, read a story together. Begin your day with purpose and the calm can follow.

Day of Remembrance

John Gibbs-Bailey "Hoskuld" | May 22nd



Y May 22, 1913 - January 1, 2003 1

John Gibbs-Bailey, perhaps better known as Hoskuld, was born on the 22nd of May, 1913. He was an Englishman who, along with Stubba, founded the Odinic Rite and spearheaded the reforging of Ásatrú in Great Britain.

Very little is known about his personal life, outside of his clear devotion to the Æsir and his Folk. It is said that he found our Gods in the 1930s, and immediately recognized that Ásatrú is meant to be lived and practiced with the rest of the Folk. He met John Yeowell, Stubba, in the 1950s, and they stayed in touch about Ásatrú for the next 20 years before founding the precursor to the Odinic Rite in 1973.

In these early days of the Odinic Rite is when he adopted the name Hoskuld, which he took from 10th century Icelandic Goði Hoskuld Dalla-Kolson. He also spent this time formalizing the doctrine of the OR, as well as eight of the Nine Noble Virtues.

By the end of the 1970s, Hoskuld decided to step out of the public-facing role and let Stubba take the reins leading the Court of Goðar. He instead took on the duties of Treasurer and continued to keep his personal life to himself.

Beyond this, we know nothing about the remainder of Hoskuld's time in Miðgarðr. He passed away on January 1st, 2003, right after the 12th day of Jól. While his personal life remains largely a mystery, his impact on the history of Ásatrú and our Folk does not. The very virtues we strive for today were coined by him, and countless Aryan men and women have come home to their native faith in the Æsir because of this alone. The noble people of Great Britain and beyond were given a chance to reconnect with their ancestors and the divine because of the 70 years of work done by Hoskuld.

Sumarmál | May 1st (Observed May 17th)



On the heels of Nornanótt, when the cattle were blessed in the smoke of the fire before being sent to their summer fields, we celebrate Sumarmál! Halfway between the spring and summer solstice, Sumarmál is often considered to be the first day of summer.

Warmer days are becoming normal. The Spring rains that helped to nourish the awakening fields have begun to taper off. The world around us is verdant again.

On Sumarmál, big celebrations were held both to celebrate the end of the harder days of winter and to bless themselves and their crops for a fertile and productive year. Men and women leapt over fires together or alone, wishing for fertility in the coming year. The Maypole was raised and around it, people danced and wove their ribbons. Women decorated their windows and doors with flowers and wove them into their hair.

Sumarmál is the coming together of men and women to celebrate life. We use this time to celebrate all the good things that we have, all of the things that we have worked hard for. We have survived the harsh months when stagnation is so easy a thing to fall into. When the celebration is done, the real hard work begins. The plan that was set into motion at Dísaþing will now begin the active stage. Those seeds that you planted, or that project that you planned, at Austra, will now need real tending.

Sumarmál marks the beginning. It marks the start of growth.

Where one has the will, all things can happen.

This long-running AFA festival is dedicated to our ancestral mothers, the Disir. Started in 2012, the Asatru Folk Assembly's Winter Nights festival was hosted at a beloved camp in Pennsylvania for its first decade. This year, for the second time, Winter Nights XIV will be held from October 10th – 12th, in Cheshire County, New Hampshire. We build upon the success of the Asatru Folk Assembly by making new friends and renewing old friendships. We look forward to seeing members and friends!

Autumn has officially started. The days are noticeably shorter. The nights are noticeably cooler. The trees are ablaze with the colors of Fall and the crunching of the fallen leaves underfoot has begun. All around us the world is dying. This was a time of drawing in close, of hearth and home and family. For our ancestors, this was not an Autumn festival, but a quiet Winter rite in which the female spirits were honored in a rite called Disirblót.

Today, Winter Nights is often seen as a death of the physical world, the world we can see, and the reawakening of the intangible. It is the world of high energy, of spirits. It is that deeper feeling and connection to the things we know to be there. This is the time we honor our Disir—our female ancestors. We remember that without our ancient mothers we could not be. They cared for the home and the hearth fires. They cared for their families. Our ancient mothers, with strength and determination, raised the next generation against odds we cannot really begin to fathom.

With the harvests finished, there is a quiet lull before we turn our minds to the hectic holiday season. Now is a good time to turn inward in introspection, and to self-improvement. It is also the time to meditate on things of a more spiritual nature. Connect to the energy that is always there.

AFA Prison Ministry



The importance of this AFA Prison Ministry is so much more than just for those who are actually incarcerated, it benefits not only them as followers of Asatru but their families and loved ones on the outside as they will see the noticeable change in their demeanor and demand that our faith commands for them to lead a noble life. We all are future ancestors and will help them be examples of our faith and not be a burden or a product of recidivism.

We are compiling letters from prisoners that are Educational, Empowering, and Encouraging along with special spiritual writings from our Gothar to create a quarterly newsletter to be distributed to inmates, institutions, and jails. Our mission is not about providing free books or literature to bored prisoners who simply want free stuff. We intend on making real-world change for the better of our folk.

""No packed rooms in the prisons; in each institution I have only a few people; occasionally about a dozen, but 5-6 is more common. I certainly do not want the Fellowship to be a club for cons, or ex-cons; the advantage is that when in prison the inmates have time to discuss and digest what they read, a point that often is lost to people on the outside in the hubbub of daily concerns" - Else Christensen

By the example of our Folkmother, Else Christensen, we will also be going into prisons as we are able to. Some of our Gothar and other leadership, will be going into the prisons to hold study groups, lead blot, and encourage continued growth in the folk inside.

Ancestral Food and Culture



Sierra's Famous Hof Pork Loin and Browned Butter Garlic Mashed Taters



Pork Loin

- 1 pork loin from Costco
- Worcestershire sauce
- 2 lemons
- minced garlic
- one yellow onion

Cut the pork loin in half to get two manageable pieces and stab it a bunch of times all over. Put it in a high sided tray to capture juices and put it in with the fat back side down. Pour the Worcestershire all over, no measurement; just enough to get it coated all over. Put it to the side and let it rest while you chop the onion into chunks and peel apart. Slice lemon into wheels. Take your cubed onion and shove slices into each hole from where you stabbed the pork loin, spoon garlic all over, as much as you would like. Lay the lemon wheels all over and pop covered in the over at 415° for 30 minutes. Uncover and baste with juices and cook 15 minutes uncovered or until internal temp is reached. Pull out and let rest for 15-20 minutes before cutting into slices

Browned Butter Garlic Mashed Potatoes

- 20 lbs of potatoes
- minced garlic
- heavy whipping cream
- milk
- 3 sticks of butter

• salt and pepper

Wash, peel, cube, and boil the potatoes. Once they are tender to the touch with a fork, strain and put into a large bowl. Pour half the potatoes in the bowl, cube and cut a stick of butter and throw it in and then pour the other half of potatoes. While the potatoes are cooling, throw 2 sticks of butter in a pan and melt it down. Before it starts to brown, throw in a few hefty scoops of garlic and cook until butter is browned and garlic is aromatic. Pour into the bowl while still warm and use a hand mixer to begin incorporating. Start slowly adding in some heavy whipping cream. Potatoes should become thick and whipped. Add in some regular milk to thin out a bit. Salt and pepper to taste.

Serve with grilled asparagus and roasted vegetables.








Springtime Seed Bombs



Seed bombing is the practice of introducing vegetation like flowers and other native plants to land by throwing or dropping seed balls, which are made of seeds encased in clay and soil. This method helps protect the seeds from predators and improves their chances of germination in various environments.

Seed bombs can be made with soil, clay, and or biodegradable paper.

Materials needed:

- Wildflower seeds
- Soil
- Paper
- 1 hosiery stocking
- a glass
- a spoon
- a blender or food processor



Step 1. Tear up or shred your paper into small piece and use them to fill up a blender or a food processor. Cover it with water and blend this paper and water mixture until you have a blended-up slurry pulp.


Step 2. Place your hosiery stocking over a glass where the end of the stocking is at the opening of the glass.






Step 3. Using a spoon, scoop out some of the paper water pulp and place some into the stocking. Spread it out a little because you'll be putting more items into that paper pulp.


Step 4. Place a small amount of soil into the middle of the paper pulp.





Step 5. Now place a small pinch of the wildflower seeds into the middle of the soil. Cover the seeds with a little bit more soil.

Step 6. Next, cover the seeds and soil with enough paper pulp to cover all of it.





Step 7. Gently pull up the stocking without disturbing the ingredients inside of it. Gently squeeze out all the excess water over the sink and form it into a ball while it is still inside the stocking.



Now you may gently remove the seed ball from the stocking and place it in a safe place to completely dry out. After it's dry, you may throw your seed bombs out into the yard, garden, or nature wherever you'd like to see these wildflowers grow.

This is a great craft for kids and kids at heart!

Hello everyone, my name is Josh Rhoades. I started to investigate Ásatrú when I was about 28 years old. I was never very religious, but I am very into history and always have been. My father had always talked about our Germanic and Norwegian heritage as I was growing up. It always interested me. Jack London Moot: Experiencing the Life of a Saxon-Son



Imagine a historic estate set among rolling verdant hills, with vineyards tucked away in the distance and a shining California sun in the sky. Numerous picnic tables await visitors, and children scamper down trails lined with dainty flowers. A lot of places in California are like this, but one stands out above others.




For nature lovers, Jack London State Park is a near-perfect moot any time of year. If you're a history buff, you'll find plenty of that as well. This estate belonged to writer and adventurer Jack London, who appropriately named these sun-drenched acres Beauty Ranch. The main building at the park, the House of Happy Walls, was built by his wife Charmian as a history of Jack's travels and achievements up to his untimely death.



A self-made man, Jack fit well into the literary world of his time, but he was never comfortable in the high society of the day. He understood the struggles and motivations of the Common Man, and the need for personal honor and integrity to make life complete. His novels and magazine articles were read worldwide, and brought him success, wealth, and fame. Few writers could describe the hard-edge of life like Jack, because he had personally experienced it.




Jack's story is shown through glass cases of documents and photos, as well as life-sized images covering the walls. They give a very personal look at the life through which he had battled, the wondrous years of travel and adventure with Charmian, and the tragedies that later befell him.




One such tragedy was his dream home, built of native rock and surrounded by redwood groves, which he named the Wolf House. It was a massive endeavor, a testament to his life and adventures but a few days before he was to move in, oily rags caught fire resulting in an inferno that consumed it completely. Visitors can admire the architectural drawings and walk the perimeter marveling at what it would-have-been.



Beauty Ranch, a model farm located elsewhere on the estate, fared better. There, Jack engaged in experimentation to make the best farm possible. He raised crops of all kinds and perfected his horse facilities, focusing his efforts on livestock health and cleanliness. The Pig Palace, a round concrete pavilion to separate and shelter pigs, can still be seen though it's been a hundred years since it was in operation.



Various old stone buildings dot the landscape, some built by an Italian winemaker in the mid 19th century. Trails led past "the Cottage" in which Jack and Charmian lived during their years on the ranch. The State of California has done a fine job restoring its original condition and furnishings for visitors to see. Old, musty, and mysterious — One can feel the essence of life with the Londons. Quaint and simple, this was a place for deep conversations, discussing manuscripts, and joyful times with friends from The City.



It is in the Cottage that Jack lived out his last days. Standing at the door of the sunroom, we felt a wave of sadness, seeing the bed, his typewriter, and his last handwritten notes. Jack passed away from kidney failure at the age of forty on November 22, 1916. At his request, he was buried beneath a giant boulder on a shady hillside, "near the graves of the two pioneer children." A simple man at heart, Jack London was nevertheless aware of his roots and heritage as a man of Saxon blood. He lived life with a passion, died, and was buried like those Saxon ancestors whom he revered. To us, his memory is, in its own way, a sacred part of our heritage. Hail, Jack London!



Colorado


Colorado Nornanótt



We read stories of the Æsir before supper, then after played board games until it was time for my kids to go to bed.

Montana

New Life



Coming back from Austra, my trailer was loaded down with four cows and a bull calf. We were bringing new life to Fólkvangr but imports hardly constituted the majority of our growth in April. The month was full of births and even as I write this, the possibility another sheep will go into labor exists.

Throughout the month, we had eleven lambs be born to our Icelandic flock. Some of these will be raised for milk and fiber, others set aside for meat and hide. The volume of wool we gather has increased significantly to where I can safely say that at current population, we at Fólkvangr can be fully textile independent when combined with our flax yield.





Out here, we seek to not be separated from the products of our labor. We seek to gain a better connection to the land and carry on the traditions of my forbears. The choices we make to do this are made easier when there are two elements of understanding at play.

First, one must understand where one comes from. I can trace my familial tree back into the B.C.E and can do so for several lines. The line that needs the most work still goes back to the 900s C.E. I can tell you stories of any genre you'd like from my ancestry. This is because I know who and where I come from. It is a gift that must be seized through effort. Genealogy is a matter of watering the roots of your family tree and is essential to living the way the residents at Fólkvangr do. It is half the equation.

The other understanding that is necessary is that the laws of nature can never be overcome. It is true that technology can make interfacing with the natural world both easier and more difficult. Here, we do not reject technology, but nor do we engage in the techno cult of the modern world. We understand that the celebrations we hold and the holy tides we participate in are intrinsically tied to the earth. From Jól to Miðsumar and back again, the calendar is helpful, but the world marks these rites as the wheel spoke rotates. The more tied to the land I have become the more tied to my faith I have grown. While it is true natural law cannot be overcome, living right soon makes it apparent that we shouldn't want to. The world and its laws are the work of our Æsir. They are as it should be and when the changing seasons bring strife or melancholy perhaps it is in ourselves, we should find fault. From our lore to the way we as a people

near ubiquitously lived less than two hundred years ago outlines a lifestyle that is in line with those natural laws. They reduce the burdens we encounter.



An example and an announcement is the birth of my third daughter. She was born April 13 at ten pounds. While a large healthy baby is cause enough to celebrate, and my family most certainly has been sharing the joy of her birth, the manner of her birth is worth discussion.

My wife and I have been integral parts of each labor. For my eldest daughter, a midwife

attended and guided me through the process. For the second and third, I handled it myself. I am lucky enough to say I have caught all three of my daughters and as such have been the first on Miðgarðr to hold them. These births happen in the comfort of my home and the more we focus on our health and our self-sufficiency, which are intrinsically tied, the shorter and easier the child birthing process has become. My youngest daughter came to us in a labor taking one hour and ten minutes. This includes first contraction and all three stages of labor. My little girl came out breech and en caul. Many would fear the breech baby, but we handled it like any other task out here at Fólkvangr. We applied the traditional solution and pressed on and as such both mother and baby are in superb health. Even recovery is quicker and a large part of this comes from the benefits we gain from being part of the world around us and not separate from the land. Our diet and our routine promotes health and the results are self-evident.

I myself have seen the health results directly. This year I have put on fifteen pounds of good clean weight and have never felt better. That newfound strength has been fully applied to Fólkvangr's expansion and my spiritual duties.

Starting with the labor I've put into this project I am pleased to announce that we have three buildings in the final stages of construction. We have thirty more acres fenced for ourselves and our fields are teaming with livestock. When I bought this land, it was a single cabin and two small sheds. Now Fólkvangr expands past my personal land borders, and we are onto my next major project. I am raising a barn for the dairy I'm establishing out here. This means Fólkvangr gains access to untampered and at cost dairy products as well as having a new business that is capable of hiring our Folk. With each business we build the opportunity for another family to escape the rat race should they want to.





Through these efforts to build up agrarian industry, I have not forgotten to build up our capacity to host events at greater scale and comfort. To see the property where it was when I bought this place to the multiple lots that make up Fólkvangr is striking. Our first Freyr's Harvest Feast was done under a massive tarp in the open framed walls. Tent camping and an outhouse comprised the facilities. At this upcoming Freyr's Harvest Feast, we will have indoor sleeping for over forty people. Warm and soft beds compared to a bring-your-own-tent policy certainly demonstrates that previously mentioned expansion of comfort, but it doesn't stop there. We also are building a shower house. Running water for both restroom and shower needs is a major step from an outhouse. We also have another two Godpoles in carving and I am hopeful one will be completed before the feast. The changes to the property will be dramatic and the event will be one to not miss. Thank you to everyone that has supported the project even in those early days where the grounds were frankly uncomfortable. That willingness to build with me, my family, and our community is appreciated beyond words.

That building of community is at the heart of our growth. We have two new households joining us in the month of May. Two men of exceptional quality will be bringing their households out and our ability to achieve progress will skyrocket but more importantly our opportunities to have our families together become part of everyday living. From the big festivals to the small weekly dinners, our community benefits when good people gather. I look forward to the marriages and baby naming ceremonies to come at Fólkvangr.



Speaking of baby naming, I mentioned that my third daughter was born this month and indeed my family held a baby naming ceremony for her. I am proud to present my newest child, my third daughter to you the Folk. Her name is Sólja Heinlein. My wife and I take all nine days to pick a name and while on the eighth day, it can be stressful, we always find the name most suitable for our child. This time we chose to honor my Faroese heritage and to recognize the attributes Sólja displayed from birth. Sólja is the national flower of the Faroe Islands, and it is known as the buttercup here and the sunshine flower there. My Sólja is a sweet and gentle girl who radiates warmth and joy. Her name fits her, and I know she will in time be a weaver of Frith amongst our Folk. There were many auspicious reasons I could wax long on for my final choice of name, and I'd be happy to go over them and the choices of her middle names at a later date but for now I will say this: Hail Sólja Wealhtheow Vera Heinlein.

Now to leave you with parting advice. You'll never regret finding out who your ancestors were and by extension who you are, nor will you regret embodying the lessons they left us. They have passed the torch to us, let us be worthy.






