

Day of Remembrance

Jarl Haakon



Jarl Haakon, or Haakon Sigurdsson, son of the Norwegian earl of Lade, was exiled to Denmark after the murder of his father by Harald II Graycloak. He soon allied with Harald Bluetooth and they overthrew his father's murderer. While Haakon became the sovereign in the west, Harald Bluetooth annexed southeastern Norway. The two would again join forces when Bluetooth needed aid in fighting against the Holy Roman Emperor Otto II in 974.

Though forced into baptism Haakon's faith in his gods was so strong that he was not only able to revolt against Bluetooths efforts to Christianize Norway for a time, but also to spread and expand his faith in his lands. In the end, powers that he could not control began to sway the attitudes of his men and he was killed by one of his own retainers.

Jarl Haakon was the last Asatru Ruler of Norway, his death in 995 CE leading directly to the takeover by Olaf Tryggvason.

So what can we learn from this story?

There will always be people in our lives who do not understand our faith or our dedication to our faith. Even our friends might choose to try and change our minds. When the people we have trusted do this we can sometimes find ourselves doubting our choices, even if for just a moment. 'What if?' Take that breath and reaffirm your faith. It isn't always going to be easy, but nothing that is worth anything ever is.

With dedication can come reward. We might not be able to make everyone understand our values and our beliefs, but for every person who turns away, there is a person somewhere whose mind can be opened by our words. There is that person whose soul longs to 'come home. They just don't know it yet. Perhaps your words, your dedication, your belief will be the thing that helps someone else find their way, and what better reward could there be for standing strong?

We must also take a moment to remember to curb our arrogance. When we become too sure of ourselves and our ability to stand tall against everything that would fight us we can become blinded by the reality of the situation around us. Always remember to take time to take the measure of the situation. Take the time to know if it is a good time to talk or to hold your tongue.

Hexannacht



When the ground was thawed, and the colder weather was beginning to give way to it became necessary to move the cattle from the winter fields to the summer ones. Hexennacht, traditionally, was a festival celebrating this very thing. The main focus of the holiday was the bonfire. The men would all gather and build the large need-fire. They would then walk the cattle through the smoke to bless them before rehoming them for the warm months. Often the men would call on Frey during Hexennacht, asking for fertility and abundance.

While the men were off blessing the cattle the women gathered together for their own festivities. They had their own bonfires and it was during this time that the women often burned herbs and practiced their local magic or seidthr. As the men called on Frey, the woman would often call on Freyja.


After the separate celebrations, men and women would come together and continue the festivities.

We in the AFA celebrate this day as Hexennacht instead of the more common "Walpurgisnacht". Walpurgisnacht is named such because it is the night before the Christian feast day honoring Saint Walpurga, who was credited with healing and repelling witches.

Men and women celebrating separately and then coming together are one of the main features of Hexennacht, as well as the bonfire. A good way to celebrate the holiday might include the men building the bonfire while the women practice communal seidthr. When they are finished the men and woman can join together around the bonfire. The women can throw herbs into the fire, and, asking for the blessings of Frey and Freyja, the men, women, and children can each take turns walking through the smoke.

Folkbuilder Spotlight



This month, the Asatru Folk Assembly would like to shine the spotlight on Folkbuilder Jessica Lambert. She has worked tirelessly to promote her church, and serve her gods and her Folk!

Thank you, Jessica, for all you do!

When and how did you find your way home to the Asatru Folk Assembly?

I joined the AFA in 2018. It was recommended by a friend of mine. She told me that this was very much in line with what I was searching for and the kind of community I had been trying to build. It has been one of the best decisions I have ever made. It truly is like coming home. The relationships that I have developed have been like finding long-lost family members. I really cannot imagine my life without the people I have around me now.

What is the best experience you have had as a member of the Asatru Folk Assembly?

In 2019 I went to Winter Nights in the Poconos. Once I found out where it was located, I was blown away right there because it was a place I actually used to go to all the time when I needed space from the city areas of Connecticut. I would often drive long distances just to ground myself and Pennsylvania was a place I went a lot. So, I already had an emotional connection to the soil and trees of the land. When I arrived, the warmth and love I received from people I had never met were mind-blowing. Every ritual, every meal, every moment was so special I never wanted to leave. Witnessing Sheila McNallen's Disir blot was so powerful I was brought to tears. The energy was so intense. Even though I had been with the AFA for a year at that point, it justified, even more, my decision to call this my church and really drove home why I believed in its mission and wanted to devote myself fully to it.

What is your advice for women just joining the AFA?

The anxiety you have is okay. When we ladies get together at events, a common theme is social anxiety. When you are amongst the womenfolk you forget about everything that makes you nervous or any fears you might have. It truly is a sisterhood. We believe in not only building each other up but also providing a shoulder to lean on when you need it. So many of the women in the AFA are so talented and have such knowledge on so many different subjects, we truly can accomplish anything together. The distances between us make no difference in our ability to form deep relationships and that is something very special right there.

How were you called to leadership within your church?

The folkbuilder at the time in Ohio saw potential in me right away. I am a go-getter and when I see a need for something I usually take it upon myself to fill it. Whether I

had a title or not I was always willing to help organize events, meet new members, brainstorm ways to make Ohio and the (at the time) Midwest region stronger, and engage its members. In many situations, I tend to take the lead if there is no one leading. It is a natural thing for me, I have a strong will and strong personality, that pushes me to make anything I am passionate about the best it can be. From day one, I have believed in the mission of the AFA and its direction. And I wanted to be a part of that. To cultivate that potential, I saw in people and grow this area to be the best and be productive and really show everyone what we really have here in this region.



Ancestral Food and Culture

Easy Spaetzle Recipe



Pasta can be very intimidating and time-consuming to make. Thankfully, the Germans have their own relatively foolproof pasta dumplings called spaetzle. There are only a few ingredients and to extrude the pasta you can use a Callander or the smooth side of a cheese grater and rubber scraper. This recipe is so easy to make. We did it at Odinshof for Charming of the Plow.

1/2 tsp nutmeg1 pinch white pepper1/2 tsp salt

1 cup all-purpose flour 1/4 cup milk 2 eggs

Water for boiling

- 1. Boil water in a pot
- 2. Mix together flour, salt, white pepper, and nutmeg. Beat eggs well, and add alternately with the milk to the dry ingredients. Mix until smooth. You should be able to stick your spatula in the dough and pill it out and the dough slowly drips off. You want it to go through the holes of the colander and drip in the boiling water. If it is too thick add water.
- 3. Place dough in Callander and hold it over the boiling water. Scrape the dough against the Callander pressing it through the holes into the water. Do this in batches
- 4. When the dumplings float to the top, remove them from water and set them aside. Place pads of butter in the spaetzle to keep them from sticking

That's it. How crazy simple is that? You can serve as is or Sautee quickly in butter or bacon drippings. Throw in fresh parsley or use it to make Kaese Spaetzle German Mac and cheese.


Ostara at Odinshof

In turn, we made personal introductions while raising the horn and toasting a favorite God or Goddess. Matt brought us up to date on AFA news, while Sheila followed with a summary of recent Odinshof District events and plans for the calendar year. The informational portion closed with Steve McNallen giving a talk on the deeper significance of this holy tide called Ostara, named for the Saxon's "Goddess of the Dawn." We were all left with the reminder to look at the dawn of each day as a cycle of new beginnings.



Outdoors, children ran like rabbits trying to be the first to grab the candy-filled eggs.



When their energy subsided, Gythia McNallen led our young Folk into the ritual circle for their own tribute to Ostara with a children's blot.

Krystal kept busy all day, putting lesser-known Irish dishes together for a grand feast. Sierra brought over a hundred cupcakes that she decorated with runes as Ashley added colorful touches to the clusters of flowers within the hall.



As the day waned, Gythia McNallen called the women together to discuss their roles in the upcoming blot. Young Dawson blew the blowing horn three times, to call people to gather. The women stood at the entry to the circle, "kulning" the men to come. As the call to Ostara was made, the clouds broke free, so we were sun-blessed for the first time all day. In our rite, we gave our respect and dedication to Ostara and asked for her to

bless the Folk in return. Gythia McNallen gave the blessing by sprinkling the mead from a sprig of delicate Baby's Breath. As the ritual closed, the women stepped forward to share the song, "Edelweiss." Then men and women sang with full hearts the Asatru version of "Tomorrow Belongs to Me."

The words speak true. "Bless our homeland forever."








Alaska

This month seeds were started in the greenhouse!



The Hagvirkr Family Grows






Asatru in Oregon

It was my great pleasure to lead them through both ritual and hike, watching the solidification of the region progress with these oaths.




There were nine sections of oaths and there were three rounds. We hiked up to a crest where a round of oaths were done followed by more hiking to the next crest.

This month we ended strong with Berserker Club where we shared skills and Frith working towards bettering ourselves in a martial / survivalist nature.


Our kinsman and his lovely Fiance pulled out all the stops in preparation for putting on an extremely fun, productive, and intensive event.

Mantra Meditation



First, an aside. I was already an Asatruar when I found kundalini meditation, so my meditation practice has been guided by The Way. I already knew that the Brahmins of India were close kin of our European ancestors (thus, the Indo-Europeans), so I find no contradiction between Asatru and meditation. In fact, the two enhance and complement each other.


Practicing mantra during meditation helps occupy the "squirrel mind," allowing it to be helpful rather than distractive. The mantras that I use are sometimes from my yoga instruction but more often constructed of our own legacy - runework.

For example, the most well-known yogic syllable is "OM." Properly written, it is spelled AUM. Looking to Thorrson and Cleary for rune meanings, we find that (in this context) Ansuz means "creative wisdom, ecstasy, inspiration, transformation;" Uruz means "Induction of magnetic and subtle energies, formative force;" and Mannaz means "enlightened man, divine ancestor, the link between man and the gods." Thus, AUM is seen to be the creative wisdom inducing subtle energy to link man to the gods. More than mere coincidence, it seems to me.

Similarly, one can use the cauldron work laid out in Mr. McNallen's book - Bothn, Son, and Odrereir. The three cauldrons have parallels not only in the primary chakras or energy centers of kundalini but also in Taoist alchemy where these centers are also called cauldrons. Thus, one can chant the name of each cauldron in succession, or the individual runes, as energy is raised from the pelvic floor and lower chakras (Bothn) to the heart (Son) and then to the third eye point (Odrereir).

Also, one may galdr the entire Futhark (I call it "making the world"; long explanation), or some other runic bindrune carefully chosen after long study and contemplation. The basic idea of any mantra work remains the same whichever technique one chooses.

So: take your place in front of your altar, or any other quiet place where you can remain undisturbed for fifteen minutes. I typically sit in the Adept Pose with my hands in Gyan mudra



When I am a bit more flexible, I sit in the half-lotus with my hands in the Buddha mudra. Either way: sit, settle, relax; head tilted down slightly, eyes closed and rolled up as if looking out between the eyebrows.

Inhale from the diaphragm; imagine the breath as a source of energy from Ginnungagap, down the front of the body into the pelvic floor. Pause the breath, then exhale and allow the energy to travel up the spine to the higher centers. With the exhale, galdr the mantra you have chosen. Be relaxed, but diligent.

You can galdr or mantra a combination of runework also: three breaths of ALU (to invoke and manifest holiness and sacrality), three breaths of AUM, then three breaths of the Futhark.

AAAAAUUUUUUMMMMM......

This work is made to raise the kundalini energy (or Ond, or Chi) from the base level to the higher centers: envision the base appetites transformed into love of Folk and Rational Judgment. Change does not come overnight but over years. I am as impatient as anyone, but I know this work has improved my life. Discipline, perseverance; 15 minutes a day, or an hour..........

Folk Futhark- Part 1

Last month, we talked about the Folk Futhark and what it means for the AFA and modern Asatru. This month, I'd like to start a rudimentary rune study, beginning with the first three runes



FEHU- This is the first rune of every main futhark, and often symbolizes cattle or wealth, as cattle WAS wealth for our ancestors. Going beyond that, Fehu can be read as a rune of opportunity and potential. Some have equated it to the potential energy that existed before the Big Bang! This fits well with the idea that the Futhark, when studied in order, tells the story of the Cosmos from the beginning to the rising of Gimle out of the waters.

While the concept and name are the same as the Elder Futhark, the stave has been replaced with the Armanen rune known as FA, which is described as "the primal fire".



URUZ- This is always the second rune of any given rune row. It's also one of the runes that means the same thing in both Elder and Armanen rows, although with added connotations in the Armanen.

As Fehu is potential power, wealth in cattle, or opportunity waiting to happen, Uruz is the logical next step in the greater story told by the Futhark. Uruz is raw, primordial power, it is the aurochs of our ancestors' days. If Fehu is your potential energy, Uruz is having your fists up. Fehu is energy waiting to be used, Uruz is energy READY to be used. Uruz is having a round in the chamber. Uruz is being centered and grounded and ready to defend or attack.



THURISAZ- The third rune of most rune rows, it is the next step after Uruz.

Where Uruz is having your fists up, or your weapon loaded, Thurisaz is throwing the punch or firing the first round. The point in the middle of the rune represents the APPLICATION of the potential energy represented in the previous two runes.

Thurisaz also represents Þórr, the Warrior Prince of Heaven and Earth. Think of the top of the symbol as Heaven/Asgard, the bottom as Earth/Midgard, and the middle point as Thunor charging forward to unleash the might of Mjolnir on anything that seeks to harm the worlds of Gods and Men

The building and grounds of Thorshof are nothing special; it's an old church and hall on a standard small-town lot. But after a few moments, you realize that there is something profound about standing in a place that is our own. You walk inside the hof and look at the art that adorns the Vé, the modern relics we use in ritual, you look to the kindred flags adorning the walls and you realize that the people who made them, our people, are standing there physically beside you. Our walls will grow stronger, the interior of our Hofs (already lovely) more ostentatious with time; but we are fortunate to be here at the beginning, during the genesis of the rebirth of our Folk and our religion. It is a "we are the ancestors" moment and, in its way, more valuable and precious than the great cathedrals of France and Rome.

Statue Hopping in Cincinnati



By March I would expect the snowy cold weather to cease. Being a California girl, I was clearly wrong. On Saturday, March 26th the morning greeted us with a blanket of snow. We hoped the snow would dissipate, however, the snow continued to fall. Members and friends from KY, OH, and IN gathered at the Cincinnatus Statue in Cincinnati.

The legendary Roman is depicted in this statue after he had defeated the Aequians and rescued the trapped Roan Army. With one hand he returns the fasces, a symbol of power as appointed Dictator of Rome. His other hand holds the plow, as he resumes the life of a citizen.

Cincinnatus was regarded by the Romans as one of the heroes of early Rome and as a model of Roman virtue and simplicity. Cincinnatus is the namesake of Cincinnati.

As the snow lessened we headed to Capitoline Wolf Statue. The sculpture shows a shewolf suckling the mythical twin founders of Rome, Romulus, and Remus. According to the legend, when King Numitor, grandfather of the twins, was overthrown by his brother Amulius in Alba Longa, the usurper ordered them to be cast into the Tiber River. They were rescued by a she-wolf that cared for them until a herdsman, Faustulus, found and raised them. This bronze statue is an exact replica of Benito Mussolini in 1931. The sculpture was meant to honor Cincinnatus.







We all agreed it was time to get warm and eat. We headed to the Woodburn Brewery, minutes down the road. We enjoyed building frith with current members, new members, and potential members. We look forward to seeing everyone at the next gathering.


I would like to thank all the women that trusted me to take them on a visual journey in deep meditation. Thank you to the women who are willing to begin this new journey of self-discovery.




To me, that is very much in alignment with what we are doing, even if it was done by



Runic Yoga Part 5



If you have made it this far this IS a very important juncture in your "Path" with the Runic Practice we will be discussing today. All I can say is do not let up. Keep going. Your sacrifice will be all worth it. Let's get right into it.

SIG Rune

Face North in IS rune stance and take 3 to 7 breaths.

Now bend down like in the picture provided forming SIG. There are 2 variations to this Rune. One with legs together and one with legs spread apart. In the beginning, you may find it easier with your legs apart.

Keep your back as straight as possible, eyes forward and fixed on something.

Breath like in any other practice so far along with periodically singing (siiiiggggg) You can picture the energy coming down from above and running into you and to the floor or my personal preference is drawing it up to my spine. You will notice a sensation in

the back of your head during it.

Keep this stance as long as possible. The longer the better. Go for 9 breaths to start out and continue to extend as you get better with it.

Stand up and feel the power within you. Take a few moments to send it out to someone like a spouse, child, or even our people as a whole. "May you have victory, health and salvation always" or something along those lines, and really picture yourself doing it. Know you are and in doing so make a true change in this world for them. Or you can take a few moments to think about your victory in the last Runes covered (NOT, EH). We'll discuss that below.

Note: This is quite a challenging position. There is nothing wrong with standing up, taking a few moments, and going again. Over time though you'll be able to withstand it for longer and longer periods of time.



TYR Rune

Face North and take 3 to 7 breaths.

Raise your arms like in the picture provided.

Now as you breathe in, picture pulling energy into yourself from below. Both up your trunk and your arms. Bringing it to the top of your head. Also, periodically sing (tyyyyyyrrrrr).

Do this at minimum of 9 breaths.

When complete, take a few moments to think about your rebirth and loss of fear. You at this point know your path, the path to All-Father, and what you are supposed to be. In reality what you always have been. Your Tru Self.

Note: The longer you do any of these exercises the greater the effect you'll see. In upcoming articles, we'll be going over how to best break up all of these practices. Obviously, we have lives and must live in this world too. You may feel that it's taking quite a bit of time to do. As I mentioned above it will all be worth it in the end but there are also ways to get the most out of it without jeopardizing other areas of our lives.

Now let's cover the transformation process that is happening in what we just covered. In NOT we discussed "Laws". The laws of this place. Entropy, fate, tension, action, reaction, etc. The Hero no longer fights it or has overcome it entirely. He has changed his "inner view" of it all. He's beaten Nature i.e. his lower self/animal self. In doing so he grabs the attention of his Beloved, his higher self, and ascends upwards to another realm. Tearing a hole to another reality, outside of the realm of the laws he formerly knew. We can view this very similarly to Siegfried and Brunhilde when he crosses her "wavering flames". He's given divine knowledge, away from here and of course "They" become "One". But in the story, Siegfried or "They' come back and that is exactly what we must do. There is still work to be done.

So now we come to the SIG and TYR rune. SIG itself in this context is kind of a transition between EH and TYR. A great victory has been won i.e. his Valkyrie, Beloved, Higher Self, Salvation, Divine Knowledge, etc. TYR is where everything changes. He will never be who he once was again. He has "stepped down from the world tree" as someone else. We are no longer speaking to the old person but a new one entirely. He rises above all that is mundane and distracts him from his mission. He is no longer spirit trapped in the matter but spirit over matter....matter spiritualized. He has "Her and Him" now within. He is reborn.

It is now time for him to go a step further. He has reached a "turning" point. He now will transmit all he has gained to the outer world for good and get to know HIM as well.

I'd like to close with what has been said so far is not easy. It may not go exactly as described either.

NOT to TYR can be very challenging. Your "old self" will be kicking and screaming the whole way. You could find much turbulence in your life. He does not want to die but he must so that "You" may live. Once to the "other side" you'll know you are no longer

the same person and others will know it as well. None of this is supposed to be easy but as with anything that has true value....it never is.



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Rebuilding What Has Been Lost



Ostara at Thorshof



Spring greetings to all, Ostara has truly returned!

In March we celebrated Ostara in the south at ThorsHof. Three grand days of folk time and ritual. Ritual to our goddess of dawn was performed by Gothi Stamm, with a hand-carved godstead (statue) adorned with flowers, and anointed with sacrificial mead. Hail bright goddess of dawn!

Ostara is a well-attested, very old Aryan deity. All branches of the Indo-European family have honored her. For the Germanic, Bede mentions Eostre in his Ecclesiastical History of England. Jacob Grimm reconstructed the name "Ostara" in his Deutsche Mythologie. We know much more about her from our Greek and Roman cousins, and she is prominently featured in the Rig Veda.

In Hyperborea, the dawn only occurred sparsely. Ritual and devotion to the goddess of dawn was of grave importance. As our ancestors moved to Europe, where the dawn occurs every day, Ostara took on the role of the harbinger of spring, of the world coming back to life after the cold, dark death of winter.

This time of year as the weather warms, the sun shines on us longer, and the flowers

open their beautiful petals to us, let us thank that bright goddess of dawn for the Earth's renewal.


Stonewall Kindred's flag proudly features a white star on a blue field, encircled by a gold ring. This is a symbol of freedom, not just from a tyrannical government, but from the oppression of modernity, and of materiality. The white star represents understanding, the realization of one's true identity as an eternal being with a brilliant destiny.

Blue, the color of Odin's cloak, represents energetic, a positive movement toward that destiny. Blue also represents death - but death to old, inferior ways is also a birth into a new, higher order of being.

The gold ring, of course, is Draupnir. Unlimited is Odin's Ring, yet it is bestowed only upon the truest of heroes - those who have sacrificed the self to the Self.

The white star symbol can only do good and seeing it can only lead to increased wisdom. Though nobody asked about this different-looking flag among the many varieties present, we hope the image went with a few of them in some small, subtle way.

Our next event will be May Day. There will be dancing, a maypole, and more. So, make sure to come out!






In the Old Norse runic inscriptions, we do find numbers written down, but it's very rare. Usually, numbers are spelled out as whole words, although, on rare occasions, the first letter of the number word is used to stand for the number.

Cardinal numbers tell how many of something, they show quantity. I'm sure you know

how to use cardinal numbers! How many eyes do you have? You have 'two' eyes. We use cardinal numbers for counting (think cardinal = counting).



Ordinal numbers tell the order of how things are set. They show the position or the rank of something. We use ordinal numbers for dates and the order of something (think ordinal = order).



And now we have a few terms to help with parts and parcels. We can almost multiply and divide. Pretty quick, considering we just started learning to count.


We can all see such a spirit and growth across the AFA, in each district and region. This is very gratifying and speaks to a bright future for our faith.





Virtue Recovery Meeting - Hospitality



The Virtue Recovery meeting is still going strong, for our Asatruar that are striving to be their best selves and have struggled with dependency. Many of us have used a traditional 12 step program, but there are certain steps that do not coincide with our belief system. For example, the need to do turn your will over to an all-knowing God, or to ask said God to remove any shortcoming. This leaves us to either go through the motions and make it work or, more commonly, feel alienated and as if there is not a program that honors ourselves and our Gods. We must give credit where credit is due and we genuinely respect and appreciate the 12 step programs that have done so much good for so many people yet have the need for an inspired and similar yet completely Asatruar congruent 9 step program, which are centered around the 9 Noble Virtues. We are able to be a hybrid meeting. This means that some of us meet together, but those who cannot join in with us via zoom! 

Noble Virtue: Hospitality Realizing that I must let go of who I have been, I hang myself from Yggdrasil, dying to who I was, and beseech the Gods for the Runes of victory. I reach out a hand to people I have hurt if it is appropriate.

In the life of an individual that has led a previously non-virtuous life, hospitality was simply out of the realm of possibilities. It was merely not a concern... to be concerned with what another may need of us. In this past life, we lived to survive, and that survival depended on the daily desires that led us away from our true selves. On quite the contrary, in many situations, we relied on and took advantage of those that extended their hospitality toward us, and would delude ourselves that we were owed or deserving

of such love and help that no act or gift was returned. Now that we have completed the prior phase and moved on to the next, not only are we able to extend hospitality to our friends, folk, and family, but we find a great deal of joy in doing so. It is an exciting and beautiful thing to be on the positive side of humanity now, and though we recognize that extending endless help to those who are struggling can become enabling and are careful of it, we take the opportunity in our lives to be of service to those we love.

Frithweavers



It was my pleasure to be interviewed on the Expedition Truth program about women in Asatru. I would like to thank Rev. Jack Ashcraft for inviting me to his program and also for his fair and respectful interview.

The topic I would like to bring to the Runestone this month is directly from that interview.

Frithweavers of the Asatru Folk Assembly.

Frith is so much more than the simple definition of "peace" so commonly used to describe it or define it. It is a reciprocal relationship between folk for mutual physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual well-being. It is a term we use within the AFA often but can never have too much practice of!

As women, we are the mothers, daughters, sisters, friends, and wives of the AFA. We are also the frithweavers.

The first Frithweaver of the AFA is Gythia Sheila McNallen, wife of Founder Stephen McNallen. Prior to ever receiving her ordination as Gythia, she was weaving the frith of her Folk. She helped create the Asatru and the AFA we know today. She truly is THE FRITHWEAVER of the Asatru Folk Assembly, and has set a standard of excellence, understanding, and caring that we all strive to attain. Before I continue, I want to thank Gythia McNallen for her dedication to her folk and the personal instruction and education she has given me over the past couple of years through not only her words, but her example.

As women and frithweavers, we hold a unique ability within us to build these bonds of frith.

First, we support one another. We celebrate together as women in times of happiness and success, and we stand together and unite in times of struggle and sadness. We are sisters, before our gods and under the flag of our church. The support of the women of the AFA has brought me through tough times and made the great times even greater.


Secondly, we build frith through the raising of our children. As mothers and grandmothers, we find ourselves in a special and important place in the lives of the young. Through our influence, we help them to build long-lasting and meaningful relationships with their Folk. As women, we tend to use the "community" idea in tending and raising our children. If you have ever been at a large AFA event, you will see the children laughing and playing, safe and sound, under the watchful eye of not just one woman, but many. When a child's laughter rings through the hall, or they cry out for any reason, each of us instantly becomes a mother, a grandmother, an aunt.

We have the gift of weaving not just our children together, but our families as a whole. Through our tended friendships, we bring generations of a family together with bonds that last and influence our lives in the deepest ways. We heal division, hurt feelings, or concerns within the Folk in nurturing ways that are gentle when needed and strong when appropriate.

One must not be a mother to fill this role. While motherhood is a blessing, gift, and responsibility greater than all, there are many who have not been blessed in this way. If you are not or cannot be a mother, you can still be a sister. You can still be an aunt. You can still help to raise and tend to the children of the church, support your sisters when they need it most, and to provide comfort and friendship to our elders. You, too, are important and needed in the fold of frithweaving.





Growing a Relationship with your Landvættir this Spring!



The blooms are in the trees, the birds are singing every morning and it's about time to start mowing the lawn!

Let's talk about honoring your Landvættir!

For many people, it's time for getting out in the backyard and putting up the wind chimes, windmills, and other various springtime decorations. Or planting their flowers or gardens is a standard part of the season. Let us also not overlook our relationship with our Landvættir! They too have been looking forward to the warmth, long days, and bustling activity that the warmer weather brings.

Let's get a very basic understanding of the Landvættir. Then we will talk about a few ways you can honor them this spring!

Landvættir are perhaps best described as the energetic entities of a specific place. The living form of that location's energetic presence or soul. Landvættir are tied to their

specific location or to their specific natural objects like a boulder, tree, plant, or even a well. They may appear to look like animals or human-like when communicating. While other types of spirits or entities may travel and relocate Landvættir do not go far from their home object.

While other spirits may interact in a myriad of ways, Landvættir will generally communicate their pleasure or displeasure through the land and objects they embody. We may create alters for them outside and leave them offerings of milk, honey, mead, or other offerings that feel right. or we may decorate a tree of theirs with shiny objects, ribbons, or bells to show our appreciation and admiration. But the Landvættir seem to feed most upon the energy of their surroundings. If the energy is good and happy then the land and all within flourish. When the energy is full of negativity then the land may not flourish. It might show signs of sickness or disease. Vegetation may not flourish and in the worst case, may die.

We as Asatruar know that we are to leave our surroundings better than we found them. We are often focused on just that with regards to the folk in our communities. But let us not forget the land and the living environment around us. Our land and vegetation nourish us, house us, and give us a place to grow our families and communities upon. Let us honor the growing and beautiful earth we are blessed to have and care for. And this spring let us not forget to thank and honor the Landvættir.

It will serve you and your community well to foster a relationship, a reciprocal relationship, with your Landvættir.

Remember the spirit of Gebo, a gift for a gift.

Take time to build a space in your yard or on your land to honor them.

Leave them gifts of milk, honey, and pretty trinkets to adorn them.

Talk to them. ask them for their blessings and tell them how you appreciate them and the beauty and enjoyment they add to your life.

I hope you found this very brief writing on the Landvættir helpful. And that you will be including them in your spiritual practices. Next month we will do a little on animism.

If you are not yet on MeWe you are missing out on all the interactions, knowledge, and information that are shared there and we highly encourage you to take part! MeWe does not collect,

share or sell your data. They do not censor. And they are a good way to communicate when we are all over the world!





Else Christensen



As we prepare for the upcoming Elsefest here in Wisconsin, I've been noticing how much of what people write about her is based on the Wiki article on her. Over the last couple of years, the Wiki article has been edited many times with less than favorable tales and false accusations. It seems futile to take on the task of editing it with facts and sources when another round of children will come through to add the lies that they believe. So, to help with spreading knowledge, I will be sharing what I know of the Folkmother. My information comes from her own voice in interviews, her words in her publication, "The Odinist", her close friends that are still with us, and the many prisoners who share her written letters. Every month there will be a blog article on the new Baldrshof District website dedicated to her. Here I offer a very brief introduction to who she is and why we honor her.



Else Christensen was born in Esbjerg, Denmark in 1913. Although she was baptized Lutheran as a child, she never felt a connection to Christianity. She even when as far as petitioning the government to declare her a non-Christian. She married Alex Aage Christensen in 1937. He was a woodcarver by trade. She worked as a handweaver until she injured her back and then moved on to teaching children and adults with dyslexia.

Alex introduced her to Anachro-Syndicalism, which is centered on the idea that power corrupts and any hierarchy that cannot be ethically justified must be dismantled. During the German occupation, they lived very well due to Alex's woodworking. Since few had his talent, his services were in high demand by the wealthy. With the cash coming in they could buy whatever they wanted on the black market including guns and ammo. This caused a visit by the German police since citizens owning weapons was outlawed. She cooperated with them and handed over the pistols they asked for so they would not search the house and find other weapons, including a belt-fed machine gun. Near the end of the war Else and her husband were called in for questioning due to their political beliefs. She was held for less than 10 hours, and Alex was sent to a concentration camp for six months. Even though he was a member of the Danish National Socialist Party, the Germans were adamant that National Socialism was for Germans only.

After the war, they bought a large sailboat and had intended to sail to Canada, but the weather did not permit it. They ended up migrating to Canada in 1951. Living in Toronto, she worked as a waitress and struggled to learn the language. Eventually, she worked as an X-ray technician and assistant to the head of the hospital until she retired.



Else recalled being introduced to the writings of Australian Odinist Alexander Rud Mills. She started writing to Alexander Rud Mills until his passing and continued to correspond with his wife, Evelyn Price, until her passing. Else was heavily influenced by his ideas about reviving the worship of the ancient Norse deities. In 1968, Else and her husband started the Odinist Study Group with meetings in their home. A year later, they would form the Odinist Foundation and moved to Crystal River, Florida. She began touring North America to promote Odinism. Then in 1970, the Odinist Fellowship was born. She started reaching out to three prisons in Florida. She recalled that the study groups were small. She was the first to have Odinism recognized by any prison system. While working in the prison, she never had any misconceptions about her purpose. She recognized that most of the prisoners were rotten apples, but she held onto the fact that a small handful would come out and do great things. In 1971, the year Alex would pass away, in the same year the first publication of The Odinist was released. This publication took off like wildfire, especially within the prison system. She continued her building of Odinism and published The Odinist up until her death on May 4th, 2005.

Else Christensen was bestowed with the title Folk Mother due to her devotion to rebirthing Asatru after picking up the torch of Alexander Rud Mills. Her dedication to bringing people back to their ancestral roots, especially those in prison is something that should inspire us all.

The Asatru Folk Assembly holds a Day of Remembrance for the "Folkmother" on the 9th of May.

There is a memorial altar dedicated to her at Baldrshof, the third Hof of the AFA.

Hail the Folkmother! Hail Else Christensen!

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Frith and Grith



I have chosen to write this because recently I have put myself in a few situations where I was in close proximity of being completely in violation of Frith and Grith and not

even knowing it, other than reflecting on where I was in the wrong. I have apologized and have made amendments that will somewhat assure that I will be mindful of Frith and Grith forward.

Frith is a large part of our ethics, Asatruar have a unique view of what is "good" and what is "bad" compared to what is commonly known as the "Golden Rule" for living that some other religions have borrowed from us. Communities of the ancient Germanic peoples were small, and each man, woman, and child contributed to each other's survival. They developed a sense of morality that stressed the need to work together as a community and less emphasis on the rugged individualism common to modern, Western Society. This focus is what is known as Frith.

What is frith?

In dictionaries today, the word "frith" (ON friðr, OE friþ) is defined as an archaic term for "peace" or "security." The true meaning is more complex, however. Historically, it evoked a sense of "reciprocal inviolability" — that is, those who were bound by frith to each other agreed not to cause physical harm to each other, no matter how much they disagreed or argued. They could neither wound, maim, nor kill each other; if they did, even accidentally, they could be considered frith-breakers and cast out from society as outlaws. People who share frith-bonds are considered to be in each other's inner yards (innangard), so among the ancient Germanics, these people were most likely related by blood or marriage. Bonds of frith usually extended to members of other homesteads in a village, but rarely beyond that. As many of us in today's times extend this frith to those that we have chosen as family as opposed to those who are blood-related, although they may be included.

Is frith still relevant in today's times?

Though we may not live in small towns with neighbors who are all Asatruar, we still interact with more people than our ancient Germanic people ever did throughout their lives, whether by blood or marriage. Society has developed to the point where we know "harm" can be more than physical, but also mental and emotional. But most importantly, the modern Asatruar faces a particular cultural struggle, especially in Western societies: Most non-Asatru are unaware of the concept of frith. Even if a non-Asatru person upholds frith to a certain degree, they will not know that it is known as frith. Since frith is reciprocal, there can be no bond of frith if one party does not recognize frith or strive to uphold it for what it means. "A mutual agreement to avoid causing each other physical, emotional, and mental harm; and to avoid negatively affecting each other's honor, worth, and luck." It is up to you to decide if such an agreement can be established and maintained between people, Asatruar or non-Asatru, in the modern age.

Grith was first seen when the Aseir and Vanir were at war, and they called for a Grið (truce) Grith has the nuance of being temporary and could lead to the more permanent "Frith" but not always. Grith is a great way to set boundaries with both Asatruar and those who are non-Asatru Who are not in your inner yard (innangard).

Grith is meant to provide a haven to worship or talk without concerns of being harmed by mutual agreement with rules and enforcers of those rules known by the parties involved. Grith tends to be used to mean peace when among people not in the in-group — that is, a meeting of a bunch of kindreds that don't necessarily get along, or a political meeting known as a "Thing".. It's more about hospitality and calling a truce. It's a limited peace, and if someone starts causing problems and violating hospitality rules, grith can be withdrawn and the troublemakers will get shown the door. If people chose to leave the designated area of the grith and settle their issue in private that's their business.

Grith in today's times.

We see this a lot with social media platforms and moderators. Also with the "Thula" of a Hof or ritual circle at a blot or Sumbel who will explain the rules prior to and deal with unacceptable toast that may be made by dumping the horn of mead, removing the person, and starting the round over. Frith is for those within your kin and kith; your innangard (inner yards). Grith is for your utangard (outer yards). Grith can lead to Frith...not always but at least it's there for us. Both are great tools for our folk.
