


Thank you to everyone who lent, thank you to everyone who donated, and thank you to all who prayed. Thank you to the Æsir for blessing our endeavor.

Day of Remembrance

King Athanaric of the Visigoths



King Athanaric, King of the Visigoths, ruled his people from 369 CE until he died in 381 CE. Sometimes called the first and greatest King of his people, Athanaric was a staunch Gothic Pagan. Viewing it as his responsibility to foster and promote the faith of his people he went so far as to execute over three hundred Visigoths that had converted to the Christian faith. Their Gothic culture was paramount, and he feared that the advent of Christianity would destroy it.

During his 12-year reign, Athanaric fiercely defended his culture against the advance of the Roman Christian conversion. In the early years, he allied with his fellow Visigoth King, Fritigern, to stop the encroachment of the Roman legions into their lands. While the two were allied the Goths managed to stave off the Roman armies. For unknown reasons, however, Fritigern turned his army against Athanaric, causing the Gothic Civil War.

In the early stages, Athanaric won every encounter he had with his one-time ally. This prompted Fritigern to turn and request aid from his former Roman enemy, Emperor Valens. Even so, despite some advances, Fritigern lost the war. The Gothic Civil War

took a toll on the land and the Visigoths, however, and when the Huns began to invade shortly after the end of the Civil War Fritigern appealed to Emperor Valen to allow him and his people to cross into Roman land. The appeal was answered, but only for Fritigern, who had since converted to Christianity, and his followers.

The rest of the Visigoths were left to fend for themselves. Despite his best efforts, King Athanaric was unable to hold his ground against the ruthless and better-provisioned Huns. In the face of starvation, Athanaric led his people into the Alutus Valley (modern-day Transylvania) where they settled. In 380 CE Athanaric was deposed and removed himself to none other than Constantinople and the lands of his once upon a time Enemy, the roman empire. The new Emperor, Theodosius I, accepted Athanaric to the empire graciously. Upon his death some two weeks later Athanaric was buried in the state to show Theodisuis's respect for the Gothic Culture.

So, what can we learn from this story?

King Athanaric stood his ground in the face of all that would have torn him down. He recognized the importance of maintaining the Culture of his people and saw the dangers of conversion for what they were. In these modern times, it is even more important to view Athanaric's struggles for what they were and to remember that the preservation of our people and our culture is so very paramount.

It's about Roots.
It's about Connections.
It's about coming home.

Let us always strive to make sure we have a Home for our folk to come back to!

For us, Midsummer is considered the official beginning of summer, but for our ancestors, who only recognized two seasons (winter and summer), Midsummer was the middle of the season. The common factor between our ancestor's celebrations and ours is the Summer Solstice. On Midsummer, we celebrate the longest day of the year and the shortest night. The dark and cold of winter is firmly past and the days are full of vitality and life.

But first, we celebrate. The best-known symbol of Midsummer is the bonfire. In Europe,

bonfires are still lit and burn the whole night through. Men and women gather to celebrate the warm days and the successful planting season by dancing around the bonfire. Many people focus on love and fertility during the summer solstice, with folk traditions that include picking wildflowers and putting them under one's pillow to dream

of the person they will marry. Couples often jump over the fire during Midsummer to be

blessed by the Gods and the Ancestors.

The planting season is finished. The hard work that began with the blessing of the tools at

Charming of the Plow and the planting of the seeds after Ostara has been finished. Now we tend to the growing crops and revel in the beauty of life. We can take a momentary break from the difficulties of life to embrace that which makes the hard work worth the effort.

As the revelry comes to an end, however, we must take the time to remember that the

days will now begin to shorten once again. Winter will come and our hard work is not yet done.

Folkbuilder Spotlight



Our folkbuilders are the bright beacon calling our Folk home! This month the AFA would like to shine the Folkbuilder Spotlight on Lane Ashby of Florida! Thank you, Folkbuilder Ashby, for your continuous support of your church, your gods, and your Folk!

How did you find your ancestral faith?

Upon graduation from college I moved to California, where after years of watching everything I learned growing up prove to be demonstrably wrong, I had to ask; what was right?

Oddly, that first bread crumb down this path came from an unlikely source. In the comedy A Fish Called Wanda, there was a character that kept misquoting Nietzsche. He was called out on it in the end and I was hooked. I started reading his works and that of other philosophers, always coming back to those of the European mind. It was the words of our Folk who spoke to me and lead me to embrace other aspects of our culture, like classical music and art... and our faith.

The first book of our lore I read was the Heimskringla. Call it fortuitous or guided, but this was the book I had to read at that time. I was not ready to accept the gods as divine beings then, and a euhemerist approach allowed me to have the gods in my life.

Over the years I came to know and love our gods as the divine beings they are, but I am thankful they came to me at that time in a way I could welcome their guidance on this path.

How did you hear about the AFA and why did you join?

I started following Asatru in California but did not find the AFA until I arrived in Florida. I had been a solo practitioner for over a decade and felt my growth had grown stagnant (possibly from the years in between coasts, "not following the waves" as Njörðr would lament). Looking online, I soon realized most groups based their identity on who they were not, or what they were against.

The Asatru Folk Assembly stood out though. The AFA focused on what they were for! Not only was their approach one of a positive, knowledgeable spiritual focus, but they were also doing things in the real world. Something no other group could boast of in any real sense. Practicing our ancestral faith in a modern world within a community is what Asatru is about. I found that in the Asatru Folk Assembly.

Why did you decide to Folkbuild in Florida?

When I joined our Future Alsherjargothi was here in Florida and I got to meet him at my first local Charming of the Plow. I wanted to help keep events going in the state, but my company had other plans.

A couple of years later I regained some semblance of a work-life balance. With more balance came a rekindling of my desire for involvement with our AFA family and I started attending events again. Shortly after that, my mother passed and the embers were fanned to a flame. About this time the Folk Builder Coordinator asked if I'd be interested in Folkbuilding again. I jumped at the chance. I have been so blessed, and I wanted, no needed, to give back to our Folk in the most meaningful way I could. I could not do otherwise.

What is your best memory in the AFA?

There are so many great memories with the AFA. My first Charming of the plow, The Óðinn's blót in 2020 at Ostara in the South, and none I'm more proud of than watching

our Florida folk grow and mature into a real community. But I have to say, I'll never forget my first trip to Þórshof and being sworn in as a Folkbuilder for our church in front of so many wonderful people. That is my best memory.

So far.



Introducing the newest AFA Kindreds




Please join me in welcoming the Northern Bastion Kindred of Idaho as the newest official Kindred of the Asatru Folk Assembly.

All new Kindreds go through a six-month probationary period before joining our family as an official Kindred.



Ancestral Food and Culture

Barley Bacon and Greens Porridge



While searching for recipes that incorporated grains that my ancestors would have eaten, I came across this recipe that has now become a favorite among my family and folk. I originally found this recipe in a cookbook called an Early Meal a Viking Age Cookbook and Culinary Odyssey, but some of the ingredients that it calls for are only seasonally available, so I put my own spin on it to suit the time. So, you can say, that this recipe was inspired by something very similar to what our ancestors would have eaten at one time, this one is just a little fancier.

Cast Iron Dutch Oven

11b of pearled barley (2 3/4 cups of barley)

6 cups of stock (any stock broth will work)

2 cups of heavy cream OR buttermilk (I prefer heavy cream)

1 lb of chopped kale

1 lb of chopped spinach

2-3 leeks OR a bunch of chives

1 lb of chopped bacon OR 1 jar of canned bacon

Optional: chopped mushrooms, salt, pepper, garlic powder

Start by adding your chopped bacon to the pot on medium heat. Add in your chopped leeks and sauté them until wilted. Then add in your kale and spinach and then just a little bit of the broth enough to create steam. Add your lid checking until greens have become wilted. I've found it helpful for stirring purposes to add in the batches of the greens, but this can be left up to you. Once your greens have wilted and have begun to shrivel, add in half of your butter and stir. Then add in your barley and the remaining stock. Cover and reduce to a low-medium for approx. 20 min. Just peak occasionally, to ensure the liquid has not fully evaporated before the barley is cooked. At the 20 min mark add in your heavy cream or buttermilk here. Allow for this to simmer with the lid on until the barley has become soft and tender, and the liquid is gone, again just peaking to ensure liquid to grain ratio is proper until tender. The final step is to add in your remaining butter, stirring generously to ensure everything is mixed well. I will typically serve this dish as a side with frikadella or koningsberger klopse but honestly, this is a great side dish to any protein-based meal.

Food Pantry at Odinshof





Our May Food Pantry had a wonderful surprise due to an unexpected visitor. When Steve and I drove into the Hof parking lot on Thursday, a car was already there. The elderly gent who stepped out to greet us, however, wasn't a local resident. His name is Roy White, and he made the trip from Salt Lake City to be with us for our Mayfest! After brief introductions, Steve and I excused ourselves as we had a carload of food to unload. Not one to stand around, Mr. White insisted on being right there with us as we began filling bags. (Did I mention that he's in his mid-eighties?) With that extra set of hands, the work was quickly done.



Saturday morning was warm and clear, perfect for a day of food distribution. When we arrived at 9:15 for the 10:15 give-away, there were already three cars in line...and the steady stream continued. By the time we were through, we had served 53 families representing 159 individuals, a 70% increase over last month! No surprise to anyone - this appears to be a trend that will continue under the current economic conditions.

As we grow, we have ready volunteers in the form of the local Boy Scouts, but our biggest obstacle is simply getting enough food to Brownsville to meet the needs of this struggling community. It takes multiple trips from Grass Valley to Brownsville to pull this off. With local gas prices now over \$6.00 per gallon, your donations to Odinshof for our Food Pantry are most welcome!

The story that describes this the best is called the Lay of Skirnir, also known as the Wooing of Gerd. Skirnir offers various precious gifts in an attempt to sway here, to no avail. As a last resort, he launches into a rolling curse that runs for several stanzas, in which he threatens to kill her father and to submit her to a wide variety of degradations and abuse. Faced with this option, Gerth finally submitted. The point of this somewhat farcical and highly symbolic tale is to underline the need for the maiden to come forth and "bring in the summer" that the crops may grow.

May's "Day of Remembrance" was for Folkmother Else Christensen. In the Midwest, our AFA kin had recently gathered for a full weekend to honor her at Elsefest. Else was a unique woman who dedicated her life to bringing Odinism to the incarcerated. At Mayfest, we were fortunate to have Sierra Chapman share the travails and victories of Else's life. In the end, she was true to her Folk and left a legacy that has influenced us all.





What is motherhood?


Motherhood is never getting any time for yourself.



Jack London - A Man for Our Times







Jack London (1876 - 1916), the world-renowned Californian author, has become a part of AFA history, too. On May 29th a number of AFAers made an excursion to his beloved Valley of the Moon in Sonoma County, where he established Beauty Ranch. He lived, loved, died, and is buried on this piece of property. Several AFA members joined the McNallens for a walk through Jack's past. From the photographs and countless artifacts in the museum built by his widow, Charmian, to Jack's craggy, unmarked stone surrounded by a lichen-encrusted fence – all clearly showed he was a man who lived

life to the fullest, on his own terms.

Of course, we found ways to ritualize the experience in a typical AFA style. We stood at the fence-line of Jack's grave, while Steve McNallen led the toasts to this extraordinary man. We then walked twenty feet away to the graves of two pioneer children who died in the 1870s. They, too, received a horn of mead. No doubt, Jack would have approved.



Jack London was a man of his time, influenced strongly by the writings of Kipling, Nietzsche, and Darwin. "Survival of the fittest" is a common theme in his books, but he also studied the human condition and described how Aryan man faces challenges in a society run by oligarchs and madmen. He pushed himself hard and with a fierce will, so his victories were great...but so were his losses. That too is part of Jack's legacy to us: We must pick up and move forward, even when we feel crushed and battered.

It's impossible to tire of Jack London State Historic Park; it is steeped in the highest and best that is our Folk. We will return again to immerse ourselves in Jack's indomitable spirit, and we invite you to join us when we do!

I shall use my time!






Dinner with Alsherjargothi

Baby Naming and Creating New Habits



Hails from the great NW. I had the honor and pleasure of performing another baby naming ceremony this month! We welcomed Briar Aíga Heinlein, daughter of Tyler and Alia Heinlein on Donnerstag, May 5th in Washington.

In the days leading up to the ceremony, I had fasted and meditated upon Briar in order to ask the Norns for their blessings upon her. From the mother Goddess Udr I drew the rune Gebo, a powerful blessing of magical influence in both human and divine worlds.

From Verdandi was the power of Eihwaz, spiritual endurance, and hard will so that she may gain her goals. The blessing from the Goddess Skuld was Mannaz, the rune of Man. It is with this that she may be enlightened to know the true nature of this world, to learn and live with her fate with an all-encompassing passionate purpose and have a fulfilling and joyful life during her time here in Midgard.

This is the second baby naming ceremony I have performed and again I have drawn the Rune Mannaz from the Goddess Skuld. This is the Rune of Man and brings with it enlightenment and the discovery of our fate. Guido von List famously wrote "live with your fate and not against it!", and this is a fantastic phrase because when we discover our fate we feel a sense of purpose. What we are really manifesting with that sense of purpose is the creative urge of evolution, becoming its expression, which is possibly why it feels so right when we do it. So, pay attention to your intuition, find that thing that consumes you and that you enjoy doing, the thing that makes a difference in the world and you will have a fulfilling joyful life here in Midgard!



This past month I have discovered the power of breath. I suppose I'm late to the party on this one, but better late than never. I have of course done some breathing exercises in the past as part of meditation but honestly, I have been lazy about this and did not want to put the time in, and really didn't think it mattered very much. Years ago, I had an otherworldly experience wherein I was meditating on the Runes and could not get past the Rune Thurisaz, so I concentrated on that Rune. Long story short I was propelled out of my body into another dimension that was loud yet quiet, and there were brilliant points of light that dripped energy. I was completely conscious during this experience; it was on my birthday and there was no alcohol or drugs involved. I believe that the Rune Thurisaz which is known as a Thurs or Giant is Mimir, that all-knowing entity to which Odin gave his eye for knowledge, and by meditating on it is how/why I had left my body. When I came out of this trance, my breathing was shallow and fast. Sometime later I replayed that incident and I believe that the shallow breathing was akin to Holotropic breathing (a system of breathing developed by Dr. Stanislav Grof), which may release DMT and may create access to these otherworldly dimensions. I, unfortunately, was not able to recreate this experience using this breathing method as I would run out of breath, probably due to my lungs and body not being used to doing it.

Fast forward to last month, I had been fighting horrendous fatigue that has left me almost completely debilitated for a very long time. I had thought it was long-Covid and after speaking with a Tele doctor who informed me I could have leukemia, I took this problem seriously and began really looking into what was going on. After some blood work which came back normal, I found I had sleep apnea. I adjusted my sleeping position, added a nose strip, and problem solved, but not before I discovered Wim Hof, the "Ice Man", his breathwork and cold showers.

Wim Hof has been known to run marathons in the Artic, bathing in Ice, meditate outside in the freezing cold, and other such activities that seem impossible. He does this by being able to control the temperature of his body, the same as some Tibetan and Buddhist monks. According to him it's the breath that allows him to do all this, and with cold showers, he has tremendous energy, and he's right.

Doing Wim's breathwork absolutely changes the energy in your body, you can feel it moving and intensely. The cold showers deaden the egoic mind, and after weeks of doing them, there is a noticeable change in mood and energy. So, this experience has led me to investigate all the different types of breathwork or "Pranayama" that are out there and it has been very beneficial. I am still experimenting and incorporating this into my daily practice of meditation and yoga, but I thought I would share it with you all as it may help someone out there.

This next month in Northern Idaho we have a midsummer celebration on the summer solstice Tuesday the 21st, if you're in the area let me know and I will send you the details.
