

Many of our members haven't made it one of our many events. When asked why, most will say something like "I don't have time"..."I don't have the money."

Thankfully, I survived. I got to see Heather again, Lauren, Myranda, Joseph and all the babies. I was present when my first grandson was born. I signed my son's marriage certificate. I was given yet another granddaughter. I traveled to Minnesota to see Baldrshof for the first time.

What I didn't regret was my visit to Óðinshof. To Þórshof. Meeting my hero, Stephen McNallen. Renewing my wedding vows in the presence of Þórr. Traveling all over the country with Rob Stamm, Bobby Shotwell, the Ericksons, the Easts, the Flavels. Chasing the sunset with my bride and our youngest daughter in tow.

One day I took off work to hang out with my oldest granddaughter. I called my daughter, told her I was picking up the baby to do whatever she wanted to do. Whether it was ice cream at the park or whatever. I then called my boss and told him I was taking the day off. He asked why? To spend time with my granddaughter. He was flabbergasted. How dare I? How dare I? I dared to defy my employers in favor of my child's child. When I returned to work, I got a tongue lashing and a "write up." And I didn't care. Nor will I ever. Because I no longer give them authority in my life. I give it the proper respect that it deserves. It's only to pay my bills.

How will you actually be remembered? Will you even be remembered?



Words from our Godar




IV: The restoration of community, the banishment of alienation, and the establishment of natural and just relations among our Folk

Our ancestors had religious and social folkways that gave them a feeling of continuity and community while jealously preserving individual rights; we can and will reestablish this natural order among our Folk. Ásatrú encourages sound, traditional families while providing an extended family or tribe to support the basic family unit. We help each other materially, socially, and religiously while respecting the privacy of individuals and families. Society would work better if families and communities cared for each other, rather than relying on coercive, intrusive "help" from outside sources such as government.



It is absolutely paramount that we as a Folk get back to having a strong community dynamic for our people. We were never meant to be solitary beings, alone, and without family and Folk around us. One can survive on their own but at what cost? There are so many joys to be had when surrounded by your people in a community or tribe that values working together towards a common goal while maintaining the individual spirit and privacy. It is in this setting that we become more than we could ever become on our own. We have the support of those around us in all matters. We are that support for those around us that need us to lean on from time to time. It is far better to relay on your neighbor, your kin, or your tribe than to be a slave to the state, begging for handouts.



In the AFA, as our ancestors did and we hold one another up, we don't owe our survival to the cold, calculating overlords of society as we see around us today. We care for each other; we build our Folk up while we build ourselves and vice versa. We teach our children, we listen to our Elders, and we grow with our neighboring Folk in a traditional manner that would make our ancestors, and the Ásatrú take notice. Take notice, that we value our heritage, that we value our freedom to live and raise our children in a noble and honorable community. That is what the Asatru Folk Assembly can give you. You just have to want to live as a Noble Aryan man and woman.





Our Educational Philosophy



Greetings students and parents!

This month, I thought I'd take a little time to explain our educational philosophy. Most of you know that we use the Waldorf education system. Some of you may wonder, what in the world is Waldorf? What makes it different? Where does it come from?

Well, Waldorf is an educational philosophy developed by Rudolf Steiner in Germany during the inter-war period of the early 20th century. Waldorf style is holistic, intended to develop students' intellectual, artistic, and practical skills with a focus on imagination and creativity. Steiner broke up his educational approach into epochs, or stages. This allows the unique needs of specific ages to be addressed and approaches catered to, rather than a one size fits all approach.

So, who is Rudolf Steiner? The founder of the Waldorf method? Steiner was born in Austria in 1861. He received his PhD from the University of Rostock in 1891. Rudolf Steiner was a contemporary of Guido von List, and most likely was an acquaintance of Meister von List, as they both were in esoteric circles, and both were pan-German nationalists. Steiner, however, approached the magical and esoteric from a more catholic perspective, a la Lanz von Lebenfels.

Steiner wrote extensively and published several books on philosophy. His Waldorf educational philosophy would eventually grow from his first school opened in Stuttgart, Germany in 1919, to being the largest independent school movement in the world only a century later. There are more than 1200 independent brick and mortar schools and

nearly 2000 kindergartens across 75 countries. There are numerous Waldorf-based public schools, charter schools, and academies, as well as the Waldorf Homeschool movement. The United States, Germany, and The Netherlands boast the most Waldorf schools.

The AFA Ásatrú Academy chose this educational philosophy because of its unique style, focus on faith and experiences, and its age-specific developmental approach. We also really like that the founder was of our Folk, a proud German, and was versed in esoteric/magical thinking. We hope you like our Waldorf program, and we look forward to continuing to serve the Folk and our kids with quality Ásatrú education.



Days of Remembrance

King Eanfrith of Bernicia | February 1st



Y 590 - 634 A

King Eanfrith of Bernicia (590-634 CE) was a Saxon king in what is now lowland Scotland, during the initial wave of conversions to Christianity in England.


His father was Æthelfrith, an Ásatrú king of both Bernicia and Deira, the two halves of the Kingdom of Northumbria. He was killed in 616, when Eanfrith was in his midtwenties. When he was killed, Eanfrith's uncle Edwin then took the throne of all Northumbria, and Eanfrith was sent north, to live in exile amongst the Scots.

While living in exile with the Scots, he was forced to either be baptized or find a new home. Unfortunately, in a moment of weakness that can almost be excused, he chose to briefly forsake his troth with the Æsir and be bathed in the name of the foreign Christ. He also married a Pictish Christian princess and had a son with her, further stepping away from the light of the Æsir.

However, when his uncle Edwin was killed in battle by another Saxon king, the Ásatrúar Penda of Mercia, Eanfrith seized the opportunity to reclaim both of his birthrights: the throne of Bernicia and his relationship with the Æsir. The Venerable Bede specifically states that King Eanfrith immediately "renounced and lost" his faith in the foreign Christ.

After returning to his throne and picking up the torch of Ásatrú, King Eanfrith sought peace negotiations with Cadwallon, the Christian Celtic king who had assisted in defeating Edwin. Cadwallon agreed to meet King Eanfrith for peace negotiations, so King Eanfrith took a small retinue of only a dozen soldiers. When they arrived to meet Cadwallon, he had them trapped and killed almost immediately, even though King Eanfrith arrived with the honorable intent of keeping the Frith and working towards peace.

Even when approached nobly and with the best intentions, the Christian snakes ambushed and killed at least 13 Ásatrú men simply for keeping their loyalty to the Æsir intact. This unfortunately ended Ásatrú in northern England until the start of the Viking Age, but for a brief moment, King Eanfrith of Bernicia restored the Saxons' native faith of Ásatrú. He cared not for the material or social consequences, as he had while in exile. He cared only to do what was right by his Folk and by his Gods.



Let us all follow his example by marching onward boldly, nobly, and honorably towards Victory with the Æsir in our hearts!

Eyvind Kinnrifa was a Norwegian landowner of noble stock, followed and admired by many good men in and around his holdings. He held a reputation for being openly, and relentlessly, Ásatrú, even during a time when it was becoming increasingly dangerous to do so.

As is the case with many of our Days of Remembrance, this one involves the villainous King Olaf Tryggvason, who Christianized his own people with both bribery and deadly force. Raud the Strong, who we honor on January 9th, was one of his many victims.

Eyvind's story takes place during the year 999 CE, as Olaf the snake was making his rounds of Norway in an attempt to subvert every faithful follower of the Æsir. One man, Harek of Thjotta, had managed to outrun Olaf and his men, escaping to an area near Eyvind Kinnrifa's lands. He sent word to Eyvind, asking for his help in fighting off a coming invasion from Olaf. Eyvind bravely answered the call, knowing that he was honor-bound to defend the Æsir and all of his Ásatrú subjects with his life.

However, when he arrived at Harek's location, he was attacked by some of Olaf's men who had followed Harek without him realizing it. They took Eyvind to Olaf, where Olaf attempted to bribe him many times to renounce his loyalty to the Æsir and

embrace the foreign deity of the desert. Eyvind declined all of the gold, silver, and land in the world, because his faith in the Gods of his ancestors meant more to him than mere possessions. When Olaf instead threatened Eyvind, his answer did not change, his will was unbroken and his resolve stronger than steel. The serpent Olaf eventually killed Eyvind, likely in a gruesome manner, but he never wavered in his piety and dedication to the Æsir.

So, what can we learn from this story?

Eyvind lived, fought, and died a stalwart Ásatrúar, even when it was deadly to do so. He did not renounce his Gods to fit in, or to make money, or to gain materialistic "glory," and not even to save his life here in Miðgarðr. Let us all look inward, into our hearts, and ask ourselves if we would have the strength to follow Eyvind's example. That strength lives in anyone who proudly walks with the Asatru Folk Assembly, and that strength will be with you for as long as you have the courage to carry it forward.


On the 9th of February, as we stop to remember Eyvind Kinrifa and his unwavering faith despite the consequences, take a moment to consider what in your own life is important to you.

Even in these times, when we are living with unparalleled freedom of choice, it can be difficult to choose faith over all else. It is sometimes easier to hide behind the idea of a pseudonym or to keep your faith hidden from those in our lives that should matter. Remember, when you think of Eyvind, what truly matters. Stand strong with and take pride in your Folk and your Gods.

Charming of the Plow | February 15th



Charming of the Plow is a ritual that takes place at the early beginning of the planting season. As the name implies the plow, or other tools used, are blessed and offerings are made to the Gods for a productive growing season. Traditionally, after blessing the plow, a ceremonial furrow was dug and then filled with cakes and other offerings. For our ancestors, this was a crucial time of year. Poor preparation often led to a poor harvest and a poor harvest led to starvation.

Ásatrú is the modern celebration of our ancestral heritage. Charming of the Plow symbolizes our willful penetration of the unyielding soil. It is with our own

industriousness, our own will, that we create, that we change, that we provide. In the Asatru Folk Assembly, we often celebrate the Charming of the Plow by planting a tree.

Inflict your will on your world. As Ásatrúar, this is a time to "charm" the implements of your own productivity. Entreating the divine to bless your tools and your plans for the year is essential to starting things off right. Inviting the divine into our plans and intentions is a great way of making us aware of the sacrality that should be a part of all you do. The AFA encourages all Ásatrúar to be Industrious in all that we do. Dream grand dreams. Make solid plans. DO big things. And after hard work, reap a bountiful harvest.

And what can you do to celebrate Charming of the Plow?



The importance of this AFA Prison Ministry is so much more than just for those who are actually incarcerated, it benefits not only them as followers of Asatru but their families and loved ones on the outside as they will see the noticeable change in their demeanor and demand that our faith commands for them to lead a noble life. We all are future ancestors and will help them be examples of our faith and not be a burden or a product of recidivism.

We are compiling letters from prisoners that are Educational, Empowering, and Encouraging along with special spiritual writings from our Gothar to create a quarterly newsletter to be distributed to inmates, institutions, and jails. Our mission is not about providing free books or literature to bored prisoners who simply want free stuff. We intend on making real-world change for the better of our folk.

""No packed rooms in the prisons; in each institution I have only a few people; occasionally about a dozen, but 5-6 is more common. I certainly do not want the Fellowship to be a club for cons, or ex-cons; the advantage is that when in prison the inmates have time to discuss and digest what they read, a point that often is lost to people on the outside in the hubbub of daily concerns" - Else Christensen

By the example of our Folkmother, Else Christensen, we will also be going into prisons as we are able to. Some of our Gothar and other leadership, will be going into the prisons to hold study groups, lead blot, and encourage continued growth in the folk inside.

Hello Fine Folk! Folkbuilder Sierra Chapman here with exciting news! I have decided to revive the Folk cookbook series, with a few small changes.

The idea is recipes can be sent into me at schapman@runestone.org. I will then pick one or two to be highlighted in the Runestone, and on months that I am at the Hof, I will pick one or two that get sent in and actually make them at the Hof and serve it to our Folk. Then at the end of the year, we will release the cookbook with all recipes sent in even if they didn't make it into the runestone as a PDF. This doesn't have to just be ancestral recipes; it can be your favorite comfort food, favorite dessert, whatever! This book will be what we make of it. Huge thank you to everyone who has already sent in recipes. The first round of Hof cooking will be at Ostara, as I am traveling for Charming of the Plow this year and will not be at Óðinshof! Thanks in advance!

Rochefort Roast

Prep time:30 minutes

Total cook time: 3-3.5 hrs

Ingredients:

For the Roast

- * 3-4 large carrots (heirloom rainbow give nice color variety to your dish)
- * One whole onion
- * One leak
- * 8oz button mushrooms (optional)
- * 1lb fingerling potatoes
- * 3-4lb chuck roast (with good marbling)
- * Worcestershire
- * 32 oz beef broth
- * 1/2 stick butter
- * 3 sprigs thyme
- * 2 bay leaves

My family roast recipe was passed down from my grandmother to my father to me: use a Dutch oven or a ceramic baking dish with a lid. Cut up 3-4 carrots (I like the heirloom rainbow carrots, but this isn't necessary) to even chunks. Roughly chop a whole onion. Clean and roughly chop a leek. Slice in half button mushrooms (if you dont like mushrooms, leave it out). Wash and slice in half about 1lb of fingerling potato. ~3lb chuck roast with good marbling to start. Add some oil into a pan and brown all sides. At this point, you're not cooking it. You're just making a nice crust (this isn't entirely necessary, but good for texture and flavor). Once browned on all sides, take it off the heat and set in your Dutch oven/ceramic baking dish. Season with salt, pepper, cumin, and paprika (use your heart, but about a teaspoon each). Do this on each side. Add your Cut vegetables around your roast. Add Worcestershire sauce (a few glugs), and a full carton of organic (or not) beef broth. Cut up half a stick of butter and scatter around the vegetables and meat. Add a few sprigs of Thyme and 2 bay leaves (making sure they are submerged in the liquid). Cover with the lid and bake at 350 for about 3 hours in the center rack. After 3 hours you can pull it out. To test if it's done, take a fork and poke it into the thickest part of the meat and twist the fork. If the fork just tears to shreds easily, it's done. If it doesn't let cook for another 20-30 minutes until when you do the fork test, it breaks easily apart upon twisting the fork.

I serve this with garlic, chive, and smoked gouda mashed potatoes with carrots.

Garlicky Smoked Gouda Mashed Taters with Carrots

Prep time: 15 minutes
Cook time: 30 minutes

Ingredients:


- * 5lbs Red potatoes (russet will work as well)
- * 4 large Carrots
- * 1 whole stick butter
- * 1/2 cup whole milk
- * 1/2 bunch Chives
- * 6 cloves garlic
- * 1 cup shredded smoked Gouda

Boil unpeeled red or Russet potatoes and roughly cut unpeeled carrots until fork tender. add the carrots towards the end when the potatoes are almost done as they cook faster, drain and add a stick of butter and about a half a cup of whole milk. Mash this up until smooth (you may need to add a little more milk). Add chopped fresh Chives, minced garlic (about 6 cloves), and 1 cup of shredded smoked gouda. Stir this all up and serve once fully combined. The liquid from the roast goes amazing with the mashed taters.

Baby Tracker









This Porrablót, we gathered not only to pay tribute to the great and thunderous namesake of the holiday, but also a naming ceremony to welcome a new child to the Folk.



New Hampshire



Out of my pack a horn and a small bottle of mead appeared and after we filled the horn, we passed it between us three and hailed the Æsir with the Alföðr taking the first round. Once the horn went round three times, we wassailed the ending of it onto the hard stone.




After a bit of snooping and moseying about, down the mountain we went, undisturbed by man or beast. The exercise was fantastic and it was good to use our bodies the way our ancestors have since time unknown. And hailing the Æsir on an isolated mountaintop with your brothers is hard to describe. This may turn into a thing every month.

NH Þorrablót




On the 18th of January, some of us members of the Asatru Folk Assembly in New Hampshire gathered for Þorrablót. The day was fairly mild for January and as the day went on though, a light drizzle began followed by falling temperatures, but the land had yet to become treacherous for our celebrations.

The holiday started as they always do, with warm greetings and catching up. Over the crackers, goat cheeses, and chips and dip, we spoke of recent doings in our homes, the AFA, and the world in general. Books borrowed were returned with new books being loaned out as other books were recommended depending on a person's interest.



Once all had arrived, we served the sacral feast. After the Lawspeaker's AFA Meal Blessing was spoken, the children, then ladies, then menfolk, then Leadership feasted. Garlic roasted petite potatoes, sauerkraut, cauliflower, corn, roast pork and herb crusted salmon were served. It was delicious and the salmon especially so. I did honestly cook the pork a bit too long, and not for the first time, but it still had plenty of flavour. I was able to tell of why salmon and Þórr are associated, and why goat cheese is connected too.

After the feast, I told of how in England, an ancient and still living custom is to Wassail the Apple Trees about this time of year in January. Wassail is an Old English word that has also come to refer to singing or caroling, the Yuletide, an alcoholic mulled hot cider, and both a toast and greeting meaning 'Be Well' or 'Be Healthy.' They will go into the orchards and sing songs to the Apple Trees and then pour hot mulled cider at the base of the trunk wishes them well and asking for a generous harvest. They'll also put toast in the bigger trees to encourage robins to come, thus bringing luck. We have very old and very young apple trees, so we wassailed them.



It went like this.

I raised my head to the heavens and asked Iðunn to hear our words and give them power, then sang this ditty I invented. 'Wassail Wassail Oh Apple Tree, Pleasant Seasons we wish for thee. Wassail Wassail Oh Apple Tree, a bountiful harvest we ask of thee. Wassail Wassail Oh Apple Tree we lift up wassail and wassail thee!' Then people

poured their tankard full of wassail at the base of the trees while my wife Lily put toast in the branches of the bigger trees.



Then came the main event of Þorrablót. By now it was full dark, and the weather was not fit to be outside in for long. Out Blóthouse was already warmed by the fire in its woodstove, so we held Blót inside. Men, women, children and as usual, a dog or two warmed themselves until we began Blót. The great Æsir were asked to see and hear us

as we read the old Þórr Prayer and 'The Folk doth Abide' prayer written by Founder and Gythia McNallen all of those years ago. It was moving knowing that we were another link in that long strand connecting the AFA's past to today. Heart, Hand, Horn happened next, and the horn's mead went into the Blót Bowl. The Blót Bowl went around the Hall with the Folk being asperged with said mead. Lastly, the gathered Folk had earlier laid their personal Mjölnir's on the High Table to also received the blessings of the Gods by way of being asperged themselves and it so happened.

This ended Porrablót and at the feet of the God Posts, the contents of the Blót Bowl were poured out.

Back to the house we went and had berries and cookies until the holiday ended.





Lessons At Home



It started as an assignment in my Goðar studies under the learning tree of Witan Brandy Fassett. It's grown into a new thing all to itself. Brandy has mandated that we as Gyðja students and apprentices, begun daily devotions to the Æsir and Ásynjur.

We began doing this daily, certain deities on certain days, and we took upon ourselves to begin using this as a teaching tool for my 15-year-old daughter, Lauren. It was she that spurred my husband and I toward finding likeminded folk to practice Ásatrú with. But rather than just focusing on a God or Goddess for a day, we began with Frigg's Maidens of Fensalir. It has begun with Gefjon, the Giver.

We read from the Trúlögmál, "Gefjon is the giver. She watches over young girls and maidens of our folk. Gefjon is a comfort to those who feel alone. Gefjon is the patroness of virgins and of land-taking."



This really resonated with me and Lauren. It's always been my intention to make sure that our ladies, and specifically our young ladies never feel alone. That hospitality is extended to the men Folk as well. This modern world teaches us to be individuals on an island without any thought to anyone but yourself. But as history has taught us, it is women who are the glue that holds the Folk together. As much as the modern world tries to make us catty and given to gossip, we must follow the example of Gefjon. To be that light when someone's world is dark, to be the one that gives, not just in the form of gifts, but give of ourselves to build each other up. To be that shoulder to lean on when we are alone.

We give offerings at home nearly every day. Some to Heimdallr, to Þórr, others to Frig, but Gefjon has been added to this daily devotion.

Many of our Goddesses are overlooked because of the lack of information we have about them. What we do have is limited, but we use what we have and build relationships, even if our knowledge is limited to single lines of a passage. Ásatrú isn't just meant to just be studied, it's meant to be a living religion. It is deeds, it is action.

I hope that you will join me in making offerings to Gefjon, the Giver. And in turn give of yourselves to your sisters of faith.

Hail Gefjon!



Here in the North of Sweden, we gathered on the last weekend of January to celebrate Porrablót. This holiday is a particularly special one for my wife and I, as we were married at Pórrsfest in 2019. 
